ED AND FRAN HANDLER



A romantic evening at Nibblers sealed the deal for Fran (Sanzone) and Ed Handler. After a disastrous blind date followed by a “horrible” Gordon Lightfoot concert, their relationship appeared doomed. However, what was expected to be their final break-up date, became a three-hour conversation, which turned into a long and loving marriage.

Fran was born in Ohio to a family with Sicilian,

German and Irish roots and moved to L.A. with her parents, two sisters and brother when she was 13 years old. At 16, she lost her mother and needed to grow up quickly. After graduation from Fairfax High, she attended City College and began working in the advertising recruitment business.

Meanwhile, Ed, who moved to L.A. from his birthplace of Minneapolis at six months, graduated from Hamilton High and enrolled at UCLA to study political science. Ed’s father died when he was 15, so he, too, had to take on added responsibility at a young age.

At 22 and 20, Ed and Fran decided to marry, despite protests from both families that they were too young. Ed worked 35 hours a week and carried a full load of classes. Raised Catholic, Fran agreed to learn about Judaism and have a Jewish marriage and raise Jewish children. “The more I learned, the more I liked it. Religion is very personal, and today I am more Jewish than Ed is,” she said. They were married by Rabbi Heller at Temple Emanuel on March 23, 1975.

From a game of basketball in 1978, Ed was introduced to Barry Cohn, who later hired Ed as a staff accountant for his firm. This led to Barry asking Ed to join him in a new firm

As a 15-year old, Shawna Brynjegard was a camper at Hilltop in Malibu when she spied 16-year old Isaac Bialik playing his guitar and singing a rock song by Love and Rockets “No New Tale to Tell.” This encounter was the beginning of one of those real camp romances. Isaac and Shawna became a couple that summer, and their partnership was firmly cemented.

Born in L.A., Isaac attended Hebrew school at Temple Israel of Hollywood, where he became a bar mitzvah and completed confirmation (and worked as a T.A. for Bruce Udelf, a former TAS teacher!). Through Temple Israel he got involved with the Greater Los Angeles Jewish Federation, which led him to a summer at Camp Swig, a summer in Israel with L.A. Ulpan and participation in programs like Dor Hadash, Havurat Noar and Halutz — where he met Shawna, and where they worked as counselors together.

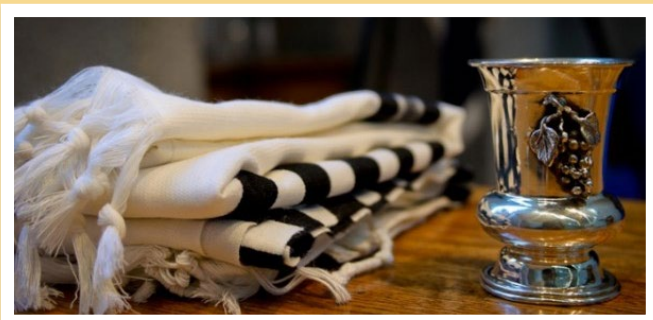
Shawna grew up at TAS, where she was both consecrated and confirmed. She was a T.A. in our religious school and

in 1980 at which Ed became an equal partner. That firm is now called Cohn Handler Sturm. Ed continues to specialize as an expert in accounting for the apparel industry.

The Handler family grew to include two sons—Seth, 32, a CSUN grad who is a bass player and is building a career in the business side of the music industry; and Jared, who also earned his degree from CSUN, who works in management with Granville Cafe. When it came time to buy a home, they moved to the Valley and attended services at Temple Beth Ami, where Fran's sister (who also married a Jew and converted) belonged with her family.

In 1993 they moved to Northridge and began looking for a temple for their sons' Jewish education. Fran attended services at TAS and met some people she knew from Mayall Elementary School, where she was active on the PTA board and worked as a volunteer. She said she felt warmly welcomed by Rabbis Brown and Stern. The next week, Ed came to an open house to join. "I walked in and knew no one. Three people greeted me and walked me through the process. They were so friendly, and it felt so comfortable," Ed commented.

remembers Rabbi Lutz convincing her to attend the BJE camp programs. Shawna credits Rabbi Phil Nadel for helping her realize that she wanted to be a rabbi by sending her to Cincinnati to attend a retreat when she was 17. Shawna said, "It made it seem possible for a normal person to be a rabbi and have a life. I found out I could do all the things I loved at camp in the rabbinate. It was a real possibility."

Married in 1994, the B2s graduated from UCLA before heading off to Israel for Shawna's first year at Hebrew Union College. The year in Israel provided Isaac with the time to explore his creative side. He visited Israeli artists in their studios, spent a lot of time at the Israel Museum and taught himself paper cutting and Hebrew calligraphy; and he began making his own art. The first piece he completed was a gift for Shawna. He began experimenting by adding comic books to his work a decade ago, finding a way to merge his love of comics and making art with his joy in reading Jewish text. "Shawna inspires me — she's my muse," he said. "We study together, and her ideas drive a lot of what I create." His work is truly a collaboration and holds layers and layers of meaning.

After three years at the Cincinnati campus of HUC, the B2s returned to L.A. where Shawna wrote her thesis on Interfaith Families and the Synagogue while caring for a newborn and a two-year-old. She was ordained in 2002 and

Soon, Fran got involved in Sisterhood where she received the same warm welcome. "TAS never disappoints," she said. "This place is like home for our family." Both Seth and Jared celebrated their bar mitzvahs at TAS. The Handlers, along with Karen and Howard Schnee, are founding members of Havurah Nagillah, a very involved and connected havurah.

Fran is a very creative artist who teaches classes on tole painting and decorative arts...another link to the Gala theme. Ed has been very active with a number of charities including the City of Hope and also with the Board of Directors and Executive Board of the California Fashion Association.

The Handlers have been extremely generous to TAS over the years, in their very quiet way. Ed says he would like to be more involved, but his disabling spinal condition prevents him from participating fully. Their style, they said, is to remain anonymous. We are all glad they accepted the invitation to share this Gala with the Brynjegard-Bialiks. Fran, Ed, Jared and Seth are looking forward to celebrating with their entire family and their temple community.

Fran Krimston

has worked at TAS ever since—teaching Hebrew, conducting High Holy Day services, leading Torah study, directing the Caring Community and handling the myriad duties of a congregational rabbi. She led the Torah restoration project for our synagogue, and got Isaac involved to lead the marketing efforts associated with it.

Isaac is an artist with a day job — he's been employed by Deloitte for 18 years in a variety of capacities, including six years as the senior communications manager for Deloitte's chairman. His current role is a creative one, and he describes it as "where communications strategy, design, and new media converge." What makes their family function smoothly is that Isaac telecommutes, working with his national team from his home studio.

Shawna claims that what makes their marriage work is that Isaac does the dishes! With the activities of their daughters—Aviva, 11, Yael, 13 and Mira, 15—they manage to carve out time together to do the things they love. You will find the family hiking in various national parks, white water rafting, riding their bikes at the beach and going to Camp Newman. Both parents have served as faculty for the last nine years. Isaac commented, "Shawna and I grew up together, and now we are watching our daughters thrive in an environment enriched with Jewish life."

APRIL MEETING - FOOD FORWARD

On Sunday, April 12, MoTAS is joining with the Social Action Committee for their regular Sundays of Service. We start at the MoTAS Meeting, where our speaker will be from Food Forward (<http://foodforward.org/>), a volunteer-powered non-profit that rescues fresh local produce that would otherwise go to waste, connecting this abundance with people in need, and inspiring others to do the same. Volunteers convene at private properties, public spaces, and farmers and wholesale markets to recover excess fruits and vegetables, donating 100% to local direct-service agencies who feed our community's most vulnerable. Combined, our diverse distribution partners provide food to over 100,000 clients a month across Southern California.



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Our speaker will be Samantha Hill, Backyard Harvest Coordinator, a Los Angeles native who recently moved back to California after a 6 years in

NYC. While she enjoyed her time living in the big apple earning a Masters Degree in Food Studies from NYU, operating a youth education program at farmers markets by day and crafting cocktails behind the bar by night, she always knew (particularly during the winter months) Southern California would eventually be where she called home again. She is thrilled to bring her experience educating students about the importance of eating fresh, local produce to Food Forward to help Southern Californian's further appreciate and engage with the bounty of regional fruit trees we are blessed to live among.

As usual, we start with breakfast at 8:45 a.m., followed by our activity review at 9:00 a.m. and our speaker at 10:00 a.m. At this meeting, we'll be announcing the results of the nominating committee. 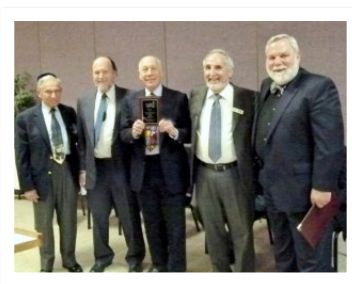

FORMER TAS INTERN RABBI DENISE EGER ASSUMES PRESIDENCY OF CCAR



Temple Ahavat Shalom can take pride in having nurtured Rabbi Denise Eger, who, on March 16, 2015, became the president of Reform Judaism's Central Conference of American Rabbis. The CCAR, founded 126 years ago, is the oldest and largest rabbinic organization in North America. While pursuing her rabbinic studies, the future Rabbi Eger interned at TAS in 1985-86 under Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman. Following her ordination in 1988, Rabbi Eger was appointed as the full-time rabbi of Beth Chayim Chadashim in Los Angeles, the world's first gay and lesbian congregation.

In 1992, Rabbi Eger played a seminal role in the founding of Congregation Kol Ami, a Reform synagogue in West Hollywood with a diverse membership of LGBT and other individuals. Rabbi Eger also has served as president of the Board of Rabbis of Southern California. She is a nationally recognized human rights activist and an advocate for gay marriage with full equality for all couples regardless of sexual orientation.

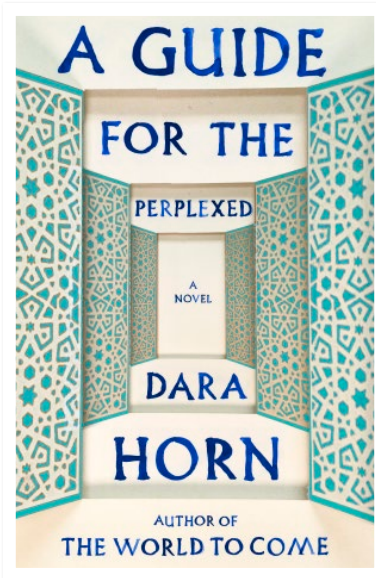

BOOK GROUP APRIL MEETING WILL FEATURE DARA HORN'S "A GUIDE FOR THE PERPLEXED"

Borrowing her title from Maimonides' seminal work, author Dara Horn has written a novel that combines compelling contemporary characters with such historical figures as Rabbi Solomon Schechter and the sage Moses Maimonides himself.

The plot involves Josie Ashkenazi, wife, mother and computer software genius, who travels to present-day Egypt on a consulting job. When Josie is kidnapped, the story recalls the biblical tale of the imprisoned Joseph. The plethora of data available in the digital frontier, as exemplified by Josie's work, intersects with the voluminous material discovered in the



1890s in the medieval Cairo Geniza by Solomon Schechter. In addition, several sets of siblings and their rivalries spice up the story.
