



SEPTEMBER MEETING (MUSLIM WOMEN SPEAK!)

Our September meeting featured four women who gave us some perspective on what it is like to be Muslim in America. Soraya Deen told us of when her six-year-old son came home from school and asked her if he was a terrorist. Edina Lekovic gave us some perspective on the range of Muslim practices, using her own upbringing to illustrate that, just as not all Jews attend services every week, not all Muslims pray five times a day. Ferial Masry spoke of her passion for America and her commitment to public service. Philippa Sklaar grew up in South Africa during apartheid, and spoke of her experience with hatred and bigotry.

The women were **very** interesting, so it was extremely disappointing that there were significant problems with the sound system. Sisterhood apologizes to everyone who attended for our failure to ascertain how to provide good quality sound. That deficiency has been addressed and sound will not be an issue at our upcoming ballot

proposition meeting on October 23.

Our speakers wanted to show two videos, and there too, we ran into technological problems and were not able to show the videos. That turned out to be caused by changes in the procedure used to stream videos from the internet of which not even Aaron was aware. BALLOT PROPOSITION PRESENTATION

Intimidated by the long list of propositions that will be on the November ballot? The 17 state propositions is not a record, but with several local measures as well, becoming informed on all the measures will take some effort.



Sisterhood has made that effort a little easier by inviting our own Fran Lapidés, a member of the League of Women Voters, to speak to us on **Sunday, October 23** and help clarify these many and confusing ballot measures. **Everyone is welcome – you do not have to be a Sisterhood member to attend!**

Six of the state propositions seek to amend the state constitution. They include Brown's effort to revamp the rules on parole from state prison, and a requirement that neither house of the Legislature pass any bill that hasn't been available for public review for at least three days.

Nine measures will ask voters to enact new state laws, with proposals on everything from new background checks for buying ammunition to a \$9-billion bond for school construction and modernization projects. Voters will consider, too, the merits of an effort to impose a cap on prescription drug prices paid by state healthcare officials that will be fought with an expensive opposition campaign by the pharmaceutical industry.

The ballot also includes a referendum - voters will choose to accept or reject a law that bans single-use plastic bags statewide. That law was signed by Brown in 2014 and will take effect only if voters cast a "yes" vote on the referendum.

SISTERHOOD MEMBERSHIP/FRIENDS OF SISTERHOOD

Thanks to all who already joined Sisterhood or become Friends of Sisterhood. Even if you never come to meetings, as long as you support what Sisterhood does for the Temple, such as providing onegs, camperships, apples & honey and dreidles & gelt for our kids, financial support for the Temple, Religious School, ECEC and much more, it makes sense to become a member or a Friend of Sisterhood. Your support helps us to supply the services and financial aid we love to provide to the Temple.

Membership dues are: Member \$45.00; Sponsor \$72.00; Patron \$118.00.

Our bylaws state that all Sisterhood members must be Temple members in good standing and that only women are eligible to join. Sisterhood has a brand-new program called Friends of Sisterhood. Anyone who is not eligible for Membership, i.e., men and non-Temple members, who contributes to Sisterhood an amount equal to the Sisterhood dues is designated a "Friend of Sisterhood" and will be able to attend Sisterhood events (including the paid-up lunch) at the same price as a Sisterhood member. For monthly meetings and the paid-up lunch, that "price" is FREE!

Someone who is a "Friend of Sisterhood" is not a member of Sisterhood, and consequently would not be able to vote in Sisterhood elections, hold an elected office or chair a committee.

Our "Friends of Sisterhood" program allows male Temple members and others in the community who support Sisterhood to show their support by becoming our Friend. It means husbands of Sisterhood members can become our Friends and can join their wives at our programs without paying the \$5 fee. It means we are a more inclusive and welcoming organization.

We encourage all Temple members to show their support of everything Sisterhood does by becoming either members or Friends of Sisterhood. And encourage your family and friends, who might be members of other Temples, or unaffiliated, to show their support of

LULAV AND ETROG




