Born in a suburb of Philadelphia, David's parents and his two brothers moved about every four years as his father's job with an oil company took him all over the United States. He went to church, attended religious school regularly and played sports. He graduated high school in Concord, CA, and his parents told him he could go to any college in California. His choice was San Diego State, and as fate would have it, he found an apartment in the same building in which a young coed named Mindy was living.

Mindy grew up in the Valley surrounded by a large, close-knit family. Her parents, Mel and Marilyn Osterfeld, who owned Pioneer Chicken, belonged to Temple Soleil. Mindy also attended services with her grandparents at an Orthodox shul on special occasions.

Until her grandmother died at age 98 a few years ago, the family gathered for Shabbat every week at Papa Herman and Nana Fanny's home. It was not unusual for 35 family members to show up for holiday celebrations. Mindy's parents still live in Woodland Hills, and her two sisters and their families are nearby.



MEN OF TAS SHABBAT

On Friday night, January 24, 2014, the Men of Temple Ahavat Shalom (MoTAS) hosted a special Shabbat dinner and service for the TAS community. The goal of the evening was to introduce and remind the congregation of the role of MoTAS in building relationships between the men in the congregation, MoTAS and the congregation, and MoTAS and the larger Jewish community. The dinner/service also provided the opportunity to recognize members of MoTAS for their service and to announce our Men of the Year.

A group of approximately 75 people enjoyed a Chinese New Year style dinner catered by Silver Spoons, one of the Temple's preferred caterers. MoTAS selected Silver Spoons because Scott Tessler, its owner, is active with the Temple Beth Hillel Brotherhood. MoTAS believes that we must build relationships between the various Brotherhoods in the Valley, and we are starting with Temple Beth Hillel. 

Men of Temple Ahavat Shalom 2014 NCAA MARCH MADNESS BASKETBALL SQUARES

We are proud to announce our new 2014 March Madness basketball game. Similar to our popular football games, we are supporting special Temple programs and needs. All of our "earnings" goes to assist these activities, which is <u>above and beyond</u> money available from normal TAS budget allowances.

The program is based on the **three** games which constitute the "Final Four," the two semifinal games and then the championship game, played on April 5th and 7th. Games are won for **both the halftime and final scores of each game**, making **six** winners in all. As before, the winners are determined by the last digit of a team's score (so 67 is a 7). Many basketball pools use a "bracketology" method, in which players predict actual winners of the tournament games. Unfortunately, this is impractical for us.

The buy-in is ridiculously inexpensive -- \$18 per square, and you can reserve up to 3 of them, and up to 3 more for your spouse. Adults only please, no squares for children under 18.

Here's how the game works --- there is a chart set up, numbers 0-9 across the top for the 'home team,' and 0-9 down the side, for the 'visiting team.' Unless otherwise designated by the NCAA, the home team for any game will be the school located closer to TAS.


- 1. Your \$18 contribution gives you <u>one</u> square in the grid. There are 100 total squares. Since the numbers are randomly selected, it makes no difference where your own square is. As such, your grid space will be chosen at random also. Unlike football, where some numbers have an advantage over others, in basketball, any number is equally likely. So, if the halftime score is Home 39-Visitor 33, the winner is square holder 9 top-3 side.
- 2. With a full grid, the total payout is \$900 (\$150 for each period). The grid is worth \$1800, leaving \$900 to give back to the temple. Payouts will be prorated if there are empty squares. If we are oversubscribed, you might be limited to 2 squares each, the difference refunded.
- 3. ***There is a possibility that all 100 squares might *not* be subscribed. Since our intention is to have six winners, for empty squares that "win," the winners will be determined as follows: please make your guess as to what the total number of points both teams will score (so if you think the final score will be 79-68, you would choose "147"). This number will be used to settle all instances, for all three games. If you purchase more than one square your "number" will apply for all your squares. Closest to actual score wins (payouts divided with ties). If there is no halftime winner, the final score prediction will still be used. If you do not make a guess, you will not be eligible to participate if an empty square wins!

Your check must be received in the temple office no later than March 28, 2014; reservations made by email (to tasboblevine@gmail.com) but not paid by March 28th will be canceled and made available to other participants.




