




BOOK GROUP WILL DISCUSS "THE PARIS ARCHITECT" OCTOBER 7

MEN OF TEMPLE AHAVAT SHALOM (MOTAS)

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"What's in a Name?"

At a recent MoTAS event, a participant indicated to me that we'll always be the Men's Club to him. It's a name that even I slip back to when describing our organization to others: We're the Men's Club at TAS. I joke that we balance out Temple Beth Hillel: They have a Brotherhood



and the Women of TBH, and we have the Men of TAS and a Sisterhood. But there's a reason why we're the Men of TAS, so let's explore what the potential names convey:

- **Brotherhood.** This is the traditional name for men's organizations in congregations. In many ways, it is a great name, for it builds on the notion that all men are brothers. Recall the song in *How to Succeed in Business:* "There is a brotherhood of man". But the name is a little old-fashioned and traditional. It is also just a little exclusionary, for the tradition has always been that you JOINED the Brotherhood and paid dues.
- Men's Club. This is the other common name for men's organizations. It goes back to the 1960s, when there were Couple's Clubs, Women's Clubs, and Men's Clubs everywhere. There is one major problem. Any notion of a club means that there are members, and some are in and some are out. That is clearly exclusionary, and conveys the message of "no pay, no play." Although dues are nice (and sometimes necessary), the intent of Reform Judaism is to be a welcoming tent, and membership organizations work against that.
- Men of At the National level, both the National Sisterhood organization and the National Brotherhood organizations have renamed themselves to Women of/Men of Reform Judaism. This is because they want to show they want all of their constituencies to participate. MRJ has gone far to eliminate dues; participating groups simply contribute what they feel is appropriate for support. MoTAS was the exemplar here: we consider all the men in our congregation as

members, and although we encourage all of the men of the congregation to support MoTAS, we do not require dues. We want participation–be it financially, through active participation, or both.

When all is said and done, we don't care what you call us (as long as you don't call us late to dinner): MoTAS, the Men's Club, or even the Brotherhood. We're a group of men who, through active participation and financial support, want to do good for Temple Ahavat Shalom and the Jewish community. I encourage you to become active (I was about to say "join us") and help in this endeavor. No membership form or dues required. All you need do is come to an event and participate.

OCTOBER SPEAKER

On Sunday, October 12th at 8:45 AM, join the Men of TAS in the Activity Center Rooms 3/4 for a scrumptious breakfast typically consisting of bagels, lox, eggs, cookies, fruit, juice, and coffee/tea (donations appreciated). Our normal monthly meeting (d'var torah,



introductions, and a review of upcoming activities), starts at 9:00 AM, followed by our speaker at 10:00 AM. This month, Aaron Solomon, our Executive Director, will be speaking on "How Temple Ahavat Shalom Works."

You probably understand how our synagogue is structured, clergy-wise. You may even understand the volunteer structure of the Temple. What you probably don't know is how Temple Ahavat Shalom operates as a day-to-day business entity. In this presentation, Aaron Solomon, Executive Director of TAS, will describe the business organization of TAS. He will cover each department including lay leadership and auxiliaries. He will provide a summary of the staff within each department including their titles and primary roles and responsibilities. He will also talk about how funds received are handled and processed to ensure funds are correctly allocated to operational budget lines or restricted funds. Lastly, Aaron will discuss how each department works together to serve the larger Temple Mission: to provide a caring and joyful community, with diverse opportunities to discover personal meaning through enriching and sanctifying our relationships (k'hillah kedosha), exploring our connections with the Divine (brit), celebrating Jewish Life and Torah (talmud Torah), and being a force for healing and justice in our world (tikkun olam). Aaron will leave time at the end for your questions on Temple operations.



Aaron P. Solomon, M.P.A. is the Executive Director of Temple Ahavat Shalom. He came to TAS in 2011 with nearly 15 years of experience in non-profit management, strategic planning and fundraising. He has a Bachelor's degree in Psychology

and Philosophy from the University of Missouri- Rolla and received his Master's in Public Administration from California State University Northridge. Aaron's Jewish communal service began in 2007 as the Administrator for Congregation Kol Ami in West Hollywood. Aaron served as the Executive Director for Temple Sinai of Glendale. At both congregations Aaron was responsible for overseeing the finances, facilities, staff supervision, programming, coordination with clergy and lay leadership, membership and fundraising. Aaron was successful at both congregations in implementing processes to increase membership, integrate new members while developing customized fundraising strategies to support and enhance the overall operations. Aaron is one of less than one hundred members within the Reform Movement to have participated in the Schindler's Fellows Program for Interfaith Families.

OCTOBER MEN'S HANG-OUT

On Sunday, October 19th at 7:00 PM, the bi-monthly Men-Only Men's Hang-Out and Discussion Groups resume. These meetings provide an opportunity for the Men of TAS to socialize, eat good food and discuss topics openly and confidentially from a men's perspective. They provide a time for us to get to know each other more in depth and enjoy a few laughs. They take place at a host member's home where we enjoy each other's company in a relaxed atmosphere. We hang out for the first hour swapping life's stories while enjoying a meal or dessert together. Some men have a lot to say and others just enjoy listening to the banter back and forth. During the second half of the evening we bring up an interesting question about how we think or feel about certain aspects of life from a Jewish perspective. Other evenings the members bring up a controversial subject to hear multiple perspectives. Our group has dynamic opinions, which make for lively conversation. At the end of the evening we all respect each other's right to an opinion and have a deeper appreciation for where our values came from.



SEPTEMBER SPEAKERS MEETING



On Sunday, September 15th , MoTAS held our first Speaker's Meeting of the year. Our speaker was Erik Greenberg, Director of Education at the Autry, speaking on "Jewish Institutions of the Sepulveda Pass." Erik spoke to us about how the institutions in

the pass represent the spectrum of contempory Jewish practice, and told us the stories behind the people who the institutions were named after or inspired by: Rabbi Leo Baeck, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Mordechi Kaplan, and Jack Skirball. From the social action and social justice belief of the progressive rabbis, the emphasis on studying Judaism to shape secular life, or strong notions of ethnic pluralism – the Sepulveda Pass really does represent modern Judaism today.

COUPONS FOR MILITARY FAMILIES

Many thanks to the TAS members who have been contributing cut and sorted coupons to our ongoing Military Coupon project. This week we sent a large box to Guam! We have sent parcels to Italy, Germany, Japan and England as well. The process is easy. All you need to do is cut out the coupons you get in newspapers, magazines or in the mail. Once cut, coupons must be sorted into only two groups: Food and Not Food. This makes using the coupons easier for our recipients.

Coupons can be left in the Sisterhood mailbox at TAS. That's in the little room on the left as you enter the Chapel. I pick up the coupons every week. Once a box is filled, it will be sent to a military base where it is readied for the families to use. Base living can be costly, and the coupons are a big help. Military families may often be able to use the coupons at the PX past the expiration date.

What is Mitzvah Day?

Mitzvah Day is a joint effort of all the synagogues in the San Fernando and Conejo Valleys to focus our efforts to help the needy in our communities. Mitzvah Day at TAS is a Templewide event for congregants of all ages and backgrounds -- it's an opportunity for adult congregants and religious school students to make a meaningful difference through a variety of projects that support many of our community partners.

How You Can Help – Before Mitzvah Day

Much of the day's success is dependent on congregants donating items that will be packaged and delivered to our community partner organizations.

To prepare for Mitzvah Day, we are collecting many items, including:




