

THE BENEFITS OF LIFELONG LEARNING

FROM THE DESK OF BARB GELB
Director of Lifelong Learning

Eight years ago, my friend Stacey walked into my office in Memphis, TN and told me she thought I should meet a man she knew in Virginia Beach, VA. She had known him for 15 years, and it suddenly dawned on her that we might really like each other, so she wanted to give him my number. To be honest, I was only trying to be polite when I told her that would be fine, but I never planned on going out with some guy named Kenny who lived about 700 miles and two plane rides away. Meanwhile, Stacey's husband Michael called the Virginia Beach man and told him about me. His response was that in the 10 years he had been divorced, this couple had never mentioned any woman to him, so this must be pretty special. He called me immediately. Two short months ago, I married him.



Hebrew, or a plethora of issues, the real bonus is the connection you will make with others. The people you learn with might not become your best friends, but they will know you, care about you and be there for you. That is what is unique about synagogue life. If you take the step to really get into it, you will be embraced by an authentic, caring community. Lifelong learning is one of the easiest ways to take that first step.

What does this have to do with lifelong learning or anything at TAS for that matter?

I think it's about the basic need for all of us to connect with others. Studies show that people who are part of a community are happier and healthier than those who are not. At TAS you might go to services, or maybe you drop your kids off for religious school. You might even go to a concert or carnival. These are wonderful events to attend, but they don't always provide the chance to connect with others, to really become part of the community.

As an adult, there is so much more for you at TAS. We offer a wide range of learning opportunities, and in addition to increasing your knowledge of Judaism, Torah, Israel,

In February, we have a wide range of offerings including lay-led Shabbat Torah study, a parents of teens discussion group with Rabbi Lutz, a lecture on Zionism and Crisis, a film about women and human rights and our ongoing Hebrew, art, and Torah study classes. Each of these classes offers you the opportunity to learn, grow and connect.

Back to my story of meeting my husband and what it has to do with all of this. Stacey and I met because we both attended a lunch and learn at our Temple. Michael and Kenny met because they both attended a parent night at their sons' Jewish preschool. We were each part of a Jewish community in which all of us were invested, and because Kenny and I were each important to them, they made the effort to get us together. What's even more significant is that our story is not unique. It happens all the time. In addition to the intrinsic value of learning, people make connections that help them find a partner, a friend, a job lead, a date for their child or grandchild.

I urge you to take the first step to getting involved, who knows where it might lead.

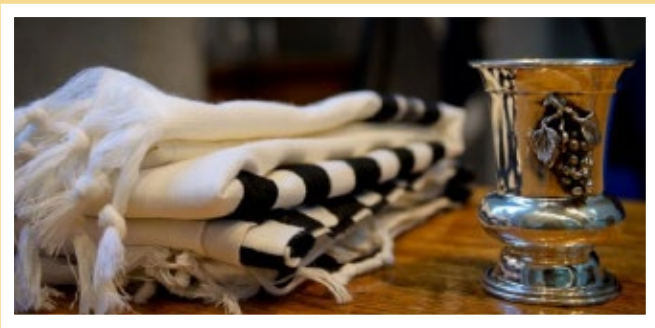

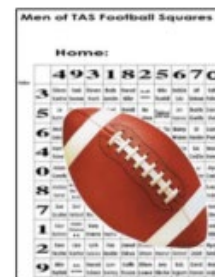
MOTAS SHABBAT

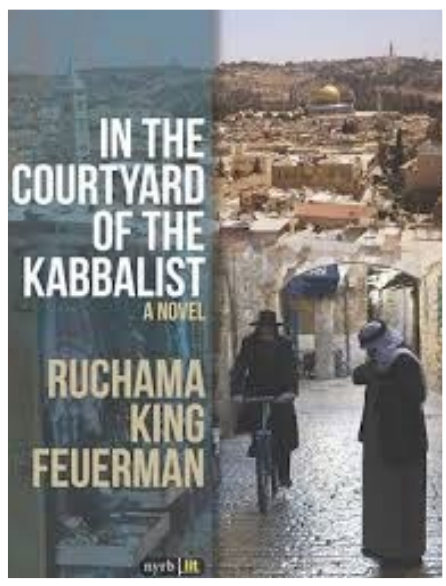

BOOK GROUP WILL DISCUSS "IN THE COURTYARD OF THE KABBALIST" FEBRUARY 12

Elaine Pfefferman will facilitate discussion of *In the Courtyard of the Kabbalist* on Thursday evening, February 12. Ruchama King Feuerman's novel was a 2013 National Jewish Book Award finalist. It tells the story of a Lower East Side haberdasher, Isaac Markowitz, who moves to Jerusalem to begin a new life. There, Isaac becomes the assistant to a revered old rabbi who dispenses advice to troubled souls. Among those Isaac meets is the motorcycle-riding Tamar, who arrives in Israel to look for a husband, and Mustafa, an Arab with a congenital deformity employed as a janitor at the Temple Mount.

When Mustafa finds an ancient shard of pottery that may date back to the first Temple, he brings it to Isaac in friendship. That gesture sets in motion a series of events that lands Isaac in the company of Israel's criminal underworld,

puts Mustafa in mortal danger, and leaves Tamar struggling to save them both. As they move about, these characters, who represent a microcosm of Israeli society, are never sure if their luck will run out or if they will be sheltered by a higher power.

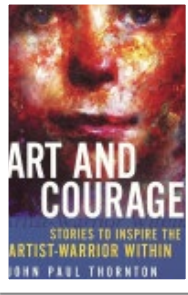

Today I will assume my responsibilities as the U.S. Ambassador-at-Large for International Religious Freedom. It is a great honor. It is linked with the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism with what has been the abiding passion of my heart: to make real the Jewish prophetic ideals of justice, peace, freedom, equality and compassion, in America, in Israel, in the lives of human beings everywhere.

The greatest blessing of my life was to do so for 40 years at the RAC. Imagine: someone giving you a job to do what you love doing more than anything in the world, day in and day out. Of course, by this point in his journey, Moses had approached the Promised Land and we have a bit longer to go, but...

I believe in liberal Judaism, in its understanding that our sacred texts were written by men and women struggling to understand what God called them to do in order to make God's values real here on earth – and that we each write the next chapter through the work of our lives.

I believe in the Reform Jewish Movement, and believe that its strength, creativity and inspiration will be the bastion of Judaism for all the generations to come.

I believe in America, in its ideals and its willingness to struggle, time and again, to live up to those ideals: that it might inspire the global community to embody the freedom and hope that is at its core.

I believe in the great cause of social justice: that we are not the prisoners of the bitter failures of the past, but that we can — and must — be the shapers of a better future for all God's children.

And I believe in you — the leaders, teachers, activists, rabbis, Jewish professionals, the members of our congregations, the families, the Jews affiliated and unaffiliated — who believe that being a Jew means speaking up for and empowering the powerless; means pursuing justice for all; means doing

whatever we can to bring peace to the world. You have made everything I have accomplished possible. You have upheld the RAC, built by the generation of the Eisendraths, Vorspans, Hirshes, Brickners, Lipmans, Gittlesohns, and Evanses — and made it a living tapestry of contemporary social justice in America.

Now the torch passed to me by that generation is being handed to the next — to the generation of Rabbi Rick Jacobs, himself a great champion of social justice, who is reshaping Reform Judaism for the better; to the remarkable, experienced, ever-creative staff of the Religious Action Center; to the young rabbis across North America who are recharging social justice everywhere; and the extraordinary lay leaders who guide this vital enterprise.

For all you have done, I am forever in your debt.

For what you will do in writing the next chapter of prophetic Judaism, all will be in your debt.

As you know, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC) has played a central role in our Movement's legislative advocacy efforts for the last 50 years — and for the last 40, has been led by the inimitable Rabbi David Saperstein. When the history of the RAC is written, Rabbi Saperstein's role in the RAC's growth and strength will be clear and his list of accomplishments will be long and impressive.

With David's retirement comes a once-in-a-generation opportunity to find the next leader of the RAC. The position requires someone with a deep commitment to social justice, the skills to organize our Movement, and the passion to inspire Reform Jews from coast to coast to take action. Once those criteria were established, the leading candidate was crystal clear: I am pleased to announce that Rabbi Jonah Pesner has been appointed as the next director of the RAC.

I know you join me in congratulating Rabbi Pesner on becoming only the fifth director of the RAC in this *shebecheyanu* moment. Those of you who know him know that he was destined for this job. His deep experience organizing congregations around social justice issues through the URJ's popular Just Congregations initiative; his leadership in the successful Massachusetts campaign for health care access, which has become a national model for reform; and his extensive experience in leading, teaching, and speaking at Reform congregations and institutions — all of these make him the natural choice.

Rabbi Pesner has been an invaluable partner to me over the last few years as one of the principle architects of the new URJ vision, as well as the groundbreaking Campaign for Youth Engagement. He will continue in his role as Senior Vice President of the URJ, where he will remain in the senior leadership of the organization in addition to his role at the RAC. Additionally, he will continue to lead Just Congregations, which will more formally become a part of the RAC's operations.

Rabbi Pesner joins an amazing staff who will spend the next few weeks transitioning him into his new position by meeting with Congressional leadership, key staff in the Obama administration, leaders of other Jewish and religious organizations, and a broad array of coalition partners with whom the RAC works on legislative priorities.

There will be much written about Rabbi Pesner in the weeks to come. In case you missed them, the first article about him has already appeared in the *Washington Post* and the URJ issued a press release. 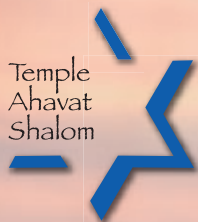
