## A MESSAGE FROM BONNIE COVELLI 50th Anniversary Committee Chair



## **TWO SCORE AND TEN YEARS AGO**

### MAX GOTTESMAN (Past President)

I was talking to a congregant the other day about the early history of the temple. She heard that TAS was started about 50 years by a small group of Porter Ranch residents who realized the need for a Reform temple in the Northridge area. They bought the land, hired an architect and erected the sanctuary and school buildings we have today. Since this is wrong, I thought I should share the true story since I was involved from the inception, and I am one of only seven living founding members.

The first Reform temple in the area was the North Valley Reform Temple (NVRT) formed in the fall of 1961 when a number of members of Temple Beth Torah, located in the Arleta/Pacoima area, decided to form a new temple partially based on the fact that young Jewish families were moving from the Arleta/Pacoima area to the Northridge area. In the early 1960s, there were now two temples. North Valley Reform Temple, which held services and used the classrooms at the Methodist Church on Reseda Boulevard, and Temple Beth Torah who continued to hold services and classes at their temple in Arleta.

Initially, North Valley had student rabbis, but as membership increased, they hired a full time rabbi, cantor and education director. In the fall of 1964, the officers of North Valley heard rumors that Temple Beth Torah was thinking of selling their building and moving to the Northridge area. It was also rumored that Beth Torah might want to merge with North Valley. Many members were former members of Beth Torah and still had "issues" with their former temple, so the informal proposal was rejected.

In early 1965, rumors of an intended move by Beth Torah were increasing so much so that the local office of the Reform movement, then known as the Pacific Southwest Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, became involved. At that time our Rabbi Emeritus Solomon Kleinman was the Director of the Pacific Southwest Council.

According to Rabbi Kleinman, two temples in the same area competing with each other for membership was not a good idea. Forming one larger temple was by far the better alternative. Several joint meetings were held with the board members of each temple. After lengthy discussions, objections were overcome and it was decided that a merger of the two temples would be the best solution. The board of trustees of each temple selected eight members to serve on a joint committee and prepare a new constitution for the new temple. This constitution was to be submitted to each temple by the end of August for ratification.

At our first meeting, I was named Chairman of the committee and President of the new temple, pending approval by a vote of both congregations. We endured three weeks of arguing over many issues, mostly how "Reform" the new temple would be. Beth Torah leaned toward Conservative while North Valley was more Reform.

After much discussion and planning on how the new temple was to be structured, we had agreed on everything except for the name of the new temple. We had left that until last. Beth Torah members of the committee wanted the name to include the word "Beth" or "Torah." North Valley members obviously wanted the words "North Valley." After considering and rejecting several dozen names, someone said, "I'm tired. I'd love a little peace." Someone else asked Rabbi Paskow, who attended many of the committee meetings, "What is the Hebrew word for 'love'?" He answered, "'Ahavah'." We already knew the Hebrew word for peace, thus the name Ahavat Shalom: lovers of peace. We had agreed on a name. The committee's work was done. At the end of August, both congregations ratified the constitution and a new temple was born.



#### SUKKAH BUILDING





2015 FOOTBALL SQUARES

The Men of Temple Ahavat Shalom (MoTAS) announce the 2015 season of "Football Squares," the full-season version of the Super Bowl game many of you participate in. The earnings from this program (potentially as much as \$3,000) are used to supports special Temple programs and needs; funding that is above and beyond money available from normal TAS budget allowances.

A brief reminder of how the game works:

- 1. There is a chart set up, numbers 0-9 across the top for the 'home team,' and 0-9 down the side, for the 'visiting team,' and the numbers are randomly arranged. There are 100 total squares on the board. The games are played over the 16 Monday Night Football games in Fall 2015 (the first Monday we're using the game closest to TAS). Your \$50 contribution gives you one square in the grid for all 16 weeks. As the grid numbers are randomly selected, it makes no difference where your square is. Additionally, each game will have a different randomly selected number arrangement for the home and visiting teams. Thus, it is rare that you will have the same set of two numbers for two different weeks.
- 2. Payouts are \$25 for a matching score for home and visitor (determined by the last digit of the score, so 17 is a 7) for each of the first, second, and third quarters. The final score earns \$50. You can win once, twice, or maybe all four times in any week.
- 3. Any adult is eligible to play. One entry per individual; a couple, each participating, can play two squares (for a \$100 contribution).

Your support of this program is greatly appreciated. You might win some money, but the Temple is the big winner! A warm "Thank you" from the Men of TAS.



## CHILLING ISN'T IT?

August 10th will mark the 16th year since the shooting at the Jewish Community Center in Granada Hills. For many of us in the TAS community, that day was a wake-up call about gun violence and a recognition of the proliferation of guns. For many years, TAS members played a leadership role in the movement to combat gun violence, and many traveled to Washington, DC during 2000 and 2004 to participate in the Million Mom March.

The recent tragedy in Charleston, South Carolina brought back terrible memories of the shooting for our community, and it has again underscored the need for our community to become fully re-engaged on gun violence. The TAS Social Action Committee has therefore committed to put gun violence front and center on its agenda, working closely with the San Fernando Valley Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence and other organizations, to involve congregants to make a difference.

Starting this month, we'll be featuring an article on gun violence in each issue of the Menorah. Each month we'll offer something you can do.

The August message is about kids and guns. In the United States, 1 out of 3 homes with kids have guns. Nearly 1.7 million children live in a home with an unlocked, loaded gun. Every parent knows that children are curious creatures. They like to explore, and if there's an accessible gun in someone's home, there's a good chance they'll find it. Before your child or grandchild goes to play in a new place, ASK "is there an unlocked gun in the house?" Brochures are available to help begin the conversation, as well as for distribution in schools.




