

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI BARRY M. LUTZ, R.J.E.

DEAR FRIENDS.

This morning as I reflect back on the High Holy Days, I am filled with awe and wonder and a great deal of gratitude. (Which, by the way, is exactly where I think you are supposed to be at the end of Yom Kippur.) I reflect back on preparations that began for us soon after Passover when Rabbi Shawna, Cantor Roher and I reviewed our notes from the previous year and began thinking, planning, tinkering, visioning for this High Holy Days. Of course this year, our Golden Anniversary, was a huge focus - and discussions began last spring as well with our spectacular 50th anniversary committee under the incredible leadership of **Bonnie Covelli**. Later as our vision began to come into focus, our Fund Development committee, under the able leadership of Ken Miles also became intimately involved. By June, sermon themes had been identified and the reading, researching, collecting of resources had begun. Soon **Debbie Weiss** and **Sheila Reback** were also beginning their monumental task of collecting names of our huge cadre of volunteers to begin to assign honors and send out letters inviting the participation of those we wished to honor.

Before the end of June Cantor Roher was holding “boot camp” for new choir members, in order to catch them up on the music for the HHDays -- and had already begun to work with the choir on the exceptional and moving Halleluyah that they sang on Rosh Hashanah morning. The Cantor’s work with the choir, of course, continued throughout the summer. The care and concern and consideration that goes into the musical selections of the High Holy Days should not be underestimated. You may have noticed a few new musical pieces this year - or slight variations on traditional pieces of liturgy. It all takes great thought and care, consideration of

the choir and of the community. And I would be remiss if I did not thank the Cantor for the exceptional work she does, and has done, in developing a sophisticated and multi-dimensional musical program - that is moving and inspiring and truly adds beauty and meaning to our High Holy Day worship.



As all of that is happening, our incredible support staff under the able leadership of our Executive Director, Aaron Solomon, made sure every detail was taken care of - and the amount of items to see to is truly monumental and unending. Beginning with seeing to the renewal of our members, every small detail regarding services from tickets to seating to usher training. Fielding many, many questions. Interfacing with multiple committees. Coordinating

our Count Me In campaign. I could go on and on, but that every detail was seen to and that every aspect of our services, from getting everyone to their seats to seamless transitions to this year’s amazing sound system is due to the incredible dedication and hard work of Aaron and our “front line staff:” **Cynthia Spoon, Leanne Lansang, Sophia Redondo and Cindy Leshtz**. I hope you will take a moment to express your gratitude next time you are at the offices.

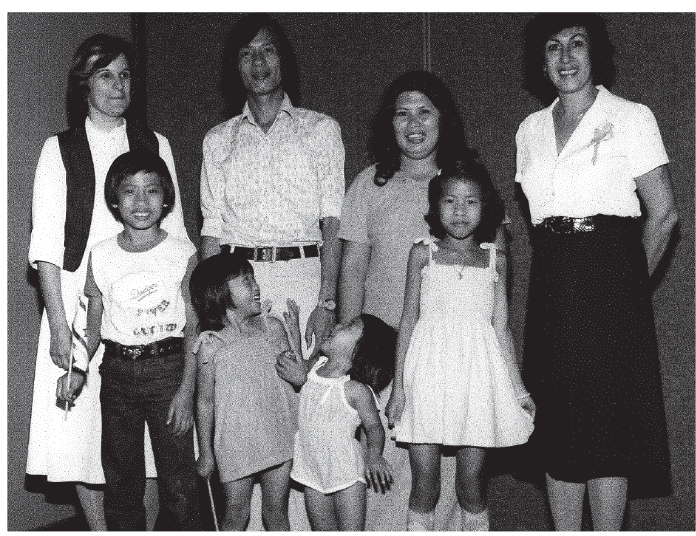

The boxes sent are the very largest Flat Rate. These go to an APO, therefore we pay domestic postage. The boxes are stuffed as full as possible, and several pounds of coupons make their way to those who need them.

REMEMBERING BESS & GARY HIMLER AND HOW OUR SYNAGOGUE WAS BUILT

HAL AND PHYLLIS BASS

Among the many outstanding people whom we have known since joining TAS in 1974, Bess and Gary Himler stand out as truly special “menschen.” At the time, Gary was the president and he was on the bima virtually every Friday night to extend words of welcome and to make the announcements. As a public presence, he projected enormous warmth, great self-confidence, and genuine congeniality. The man we soon got to know on a personal level in every way lived up to these traits.



Bess and Gary’s personal family story is noteworthy, reflecting aspects of the American Jewish experience during the first half of the 20th century. Bess’s family was fortunate to leave Odessa, Russia in 1917, before the outbreak of the revolution. They settled in Milwaukee, where Bess was born November 8, 1924. Gary was born in Vienna on June 6, 1925. On Kristallnacht in November 1938, Gary and his father were arrested. While Gary was released later that night, his father was taken to Dachau, where he spent three months before they were able to secure his release. In 1939, Gary was among the 10,000 children who were sent on one of the Kinder Transports to England, where he lived for a year with a Quaker family in Sussex. With an affidavit from a relative in the U.S. who would take responsibility for them as needed, his parents were able to leave Vienna on one of the last trains by which Jews were permitted to exit Austria. Gary and his parents were reunited in the United States in 1940.

Bess and Gary met in high school in Milwaukee, and both started college together at age 16. With one trimester to go before his degree, Gary entered the Navy. Returning home from the war, he completed his studies in electrical engineering at Marquette University, from where Bess graduated with a degree in chemistry. Gary went on to earn a master’s degree at the Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago. The Himlers were married in 1946.

Bess and Gary were founding members of TAS. They generously underwrote the cost of building the second multi-purpose structure at the south end of our property, completed in 1973. However, they had no desire to have their names on the building. It is called the Martyrs Building, on which there is a plaque memorializing the 11 Israeli athletes murdered by Palestinian terrorists at the 1972 Munich Olympics.

Having just received from the Himlers’ daughter Janet some old Menorah clippings, we were moved by Gary’s reflections on assuming the presidency in 1972, an office which he held for four years. His Menorah column tells us of his “great reluctance” to become president. He goes on to express the following: “Today, only 90 days later, I am actually grateful to the nominating committee for not allowing me to say, ‘No.’ The excitement and fulfillment which comes from one’s own involvement in a project cannot be described; it is a feeling which has to be experienced.” Gary continued with praise for his fellow officers and trustees whom he believed to be similarly engaged in the same “spirit of involvement.”

Gary’s presidency included the challenge of finding a rabbi who would ensure the stability of the young congregation, which had experienced far too many rabbinic changes. Gary’s leadership in bringing Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman to the pulpit in 1973 accomplished that goal.

Within a year or two after our affiliation, the havurah concept was introduced at TAS, and we were part of the

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Himlers' newly formed havurah, which was later named Havurah Yonatan, in memory of Lt. Col. Yonatan Netanyahu, who commanded and was killed in the Entebbe raid on July 4, 1976. Our group included other founders, Sylvia and Sam Alster, Esther and Harvey Saritzky, and Ruth and Max Lupul. So it is not surprising that a number of us newer and younger members were mentored and inspired to take on leadership roles in the years ahead.

Bess and Gary were unstintingly hospitable to the havurah, and many of our events were held in their home on Zelzah Avenue in Granada Hills. In addition, Bess was a wonderful cook, and often included us in family holiday celebrations. We particularly remember Bess's matzah balls, challah, apple walnut cake, and German potato salad. She baked large quantities of challah, and for several years baked the challahs for the Oneg Shabbats following Friday night services. In those days, the Sisterhood preferred to serve homemade baked products, and whenever we failed to have enough, Bess would run home at the last minute and bring over a bundt cake or cookies that she had in reserve.

For his part, Gary, along with Dr. Max Lupul, became the temple's Mr. Fix-Its. Gary and Max's ability to repair almost anything brought them into members' homes to fix appliances or do plumbing – with the fees generated by their expertise donated entirely to TAS.

When Rabbi Kleinman set forth a vision to build a permanent sanctuary-social hall complex, Gary was the man who came on board as the central figure overseeing the various committees which soon formed. He recognized leadership qualities in Jerry Pfefferman and appointed him to spearhead the fundraising effort. Gary worked tirelessly with the subcommittees, which included a needs assessment and selection of the architect. Gary drove Phyllis and the other Building Committee members around the city on interviews. One such interview was with an up-and-coming architect, Frank Gehry, who invited us into his studio and showed us a retrospective of his work. The committee ultimately felt he was too avant garde and chose the safer path of the architectural firm of Brent, Robbins & Brown that had designed Temples Steven S. Wise and Ramat Zion. An exciting ground breaking ceremony took place in 1977, and members watched with anticipation during the year of construction. Our synagogue-social hall complex was not quite complete; but with a special permit from the city, the entire congregation, and especially Bess and Gary and those of us close to the project, were thrilled to celebrate the High Holy Days of 1978 in our spacious new facilities.

Bess and Gary gave most generously of their means to the fundraising campaign. Being extremely modest, they initially did not wish to have a plaque of recognition. However, they were ultimately persuaded that their efforts needed to be permanently etched into the history of the building effort. So it happens that Bess and Gary are honored on a plaque for sponsoring the ark, but they also chose to pay tribute to the memory of Rabbi Kleinman's father, Rabbi Philip Kleinman, on the plaque, which is affixed to right of the ark.

Our daughter Laura was a friend of Janet's, and both of our daughters, Laura and Alana, fondly remember Bess in another context, having worked for several years at the market research firm where she was employed.



We have enjoyed the renewal of our friendship with the Himlers' daughters, Judi and Janet, who have in recent years both returned to Los Angeles. The Himlers' son, David, lives in Lake Havasu, AZ. We are delighted that Judi and Janet from time to time have joined us for worship, including the August Shabbabaque in celebration of the 50th Anniversary of Temple Ahavat Shalom.

Bess died on October 4, 1992, and Gary on November 10, 2008. We will always remember Bess and Gary Himler for their warmth, kindness, vision, and largesse of spirit.

The success of the Golf Tournament depends on you.



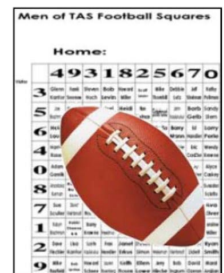

UPCOMING ACTIVITIES

SPEAKERS PROGRAM

On Sunday, October 11th, join the Men of TAS at 8:45 a.m. in Activity Center 5/6 for a scrumptious breakfast typically consisting of bagels, lox, eggs, cookies, fruit, juice, and coffee/tea (donations appreciated). Our normal monthly meeting (d'var torah, introductions, and a review of upcoming activities), starts at 9:00 a.m., followed by our speaker at 10:00 a.m. This month, our topic is "Alphonse Capone: Public Enemy No. 1." Here's the description from our speaker, Hal Bass:



Prohibition went into effect on January 17, 1920, Al Capone's 21st birthday. By then, the Brooklyn-born son of respectable, hard-working Neapolitan immigrants had moved to Chicago, a city whose mayor and police department he would eventually own. "Scarface," from a deep gash he suffered on the left side of his face during a barroom fight, consolidated his takeover of illegal liquor distribution, prostitution, loan-

sharking and other rackets through the infamous St. Valentine's Day massacre on February 14, 1929.

Capone was ultimately convicted of income tax evasion and sent to federal prison in 1932. There, he was diagnosed with



neurosyphilis, which he had acquired years earlier while "sampling the merchandise" at a Chicago brothel where he had worked as a bouncer. Paroled in 1939 after prison psychologists determined he now had the mind of a child, Capone retired to his estate on Palm Island, Florida, and died there in 1947, just shy of his 48th birthday.

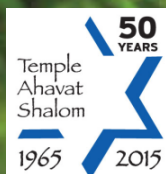

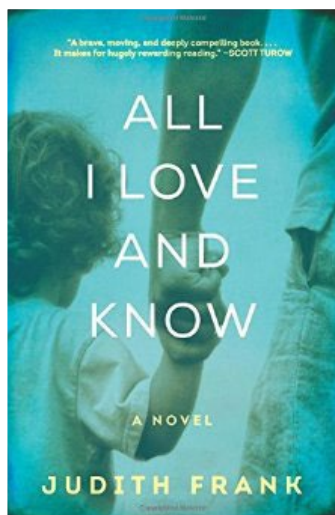

BOOK GROUP SELECTION FOR OCTOBER 6 IS "ALL I LOVE AND KNOW" BY JUDITH FRANK

This is an intense drama of a modern American family that explores adoption and gay marriage. For years, Matthew Greene and Daniel Rosen have enjoyed a quiet domestic life together in Northampton, Massachusetts. Opposites in many ways, they have grown together and made their relationship work. But when they learn that Daniel's twin brother and sister-in-law have been killed in a bombing in Jerusalem, their lives are suddenly, utterly transformed.

In dealing with their families and the need to make a decision about who will raise the deceased couple's two children, both Matthew and Daniel are confronted with challenges that strike at the very heart of their relationship. What is Matthew's place in an extended family that does not completely accept him or the commitment he and Daniel have made? How do Daniel's questions about his

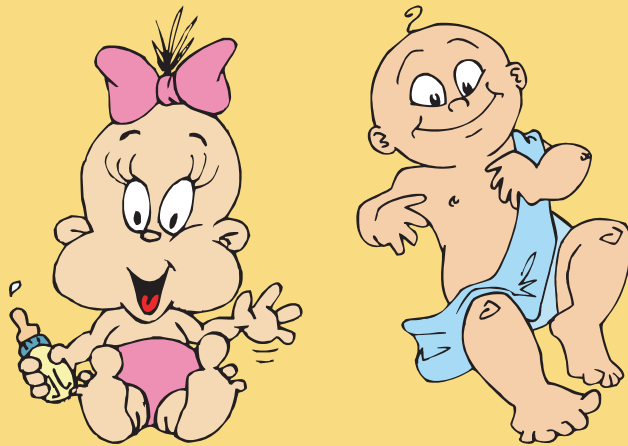
