REMEMBERING OUR RABBI EMERITUS SOLOMON F. KLEINMAN

Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman passed away on October 9, 2015. He was 95 and in recent years had been a resident of the Jewish Home for the Aging in Reseda. Many at TAS will recall the joyous celebration of Rabbi Kleinman's life and career on the occasion of his 90th birthday in 2010. The celebration was a two-part event: a packed Friday night service

on April 9 conducted by Rabbi Lutz and a Sunday evening cocktail party and dinner on April 11.

FAMILY AND EARLY YEARS:

Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman was born in St. Paul, MN, on March 8, 1920. His parents were Rabbi Philip and Yetta Kleinman. Sol was the middle child, between brothers Matthew and Norman. At the time of his birth, Sol's father was the rabbi of the Congregation of Aaron, a Conservative synagogue in St. Paul. When

Sol was 5, the family moved to Milwaukee, and from that age through high school he attended Jewish summer camp in upstate New York. The experiences at camp would inform Sol's approach to Jewish communal life when he ultimately entered the rabbinate.

After graduating from Milwaukee's Washington High School at age 17, Sol entered the University of Minnesota, where his older brother Matt was serving a dental internship. Sol majored in Philosophy. The following year, after his parents moved to Portland, where his dad had become the rabbi at Congregation Neveh Tzedek, Sol transferred to Reed College and later to the University of Washington in Seattle.

Sol met Shirley Rickles at a theatrical event at the University of Washington. Sol and Shirley were married in 1942. Sol's

father performed the ceremony at Congregation Neveh Tzedek. Sol interrupted his studies to enlist in the Army Air Corps, where he attained the rank of 1st Lieutenant. He became a navigator and instructor on B-24 bombers. Shirley, who passed away several years ago, would pursue a career as a publicist and journalist, writing extensively for the Jewish

press.

Returning home, Sol completed his B.A. in Philosophy at the University of Washington under the G.I. Bill, and soon after announced his intention to study for the rabbinate. Unlike his father, Sol chose the Reform movement and entered Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati in 1948 with his parents' full support. Ordained in 1952, he and many of his classmates, most notably Amos Schauss, Alexander

Schindler and Balfour Brickner, would go on to

distinguished careers in the rabbinate. Rabbi Kleinman's diploma was signed by two luminaries of the Reform movement: Rabbi Maurice Eisendrath and the eminent archaeologist, Rabbi Nelson Glueck. Rabbi Kleinman's first congregation was Temple Beth El of Niagara Falls, which he served until 1956.

Sol and Shirley then moved to California and settled in North Hollywood, where their children Sandy and Joel grew up. Sandy is a retired federal administrative law judge married to Conrad Rogers. Joel is a theatrical talent agent. Joel and his wife Margit have two children: Sarah, a graduate of UC Berkeley, and Gideon, a UCLA graduate.

A CAREER RICH IN ACCOMPLISHMENT:

Having arrived in Los Angeles in 1956 to assume the position of Associate Regional Director for the Union for Reform Judaism, which at the time was known as the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Rabbi Kleinman became the Regional Director two years later. Among the many achievements during his seven years in this position, Rabbi Kleinman brought a large number of new congregations into the URJ. He took special pride in the establishment of Camp Swig under URJ auspices. The site originally had been owned and operated by several prominent Jewish leaders in San Francisco, who invited the Reform movement to provide Jewish programming at their lush 210-acre facility in the Santa Cruz Mountains. Rabbi Kleinman used his considerable powers of persuasion to convince Ben Swig, owner of San Francisco's Fairmont Hotel, and the others to donate the entire property to the Reform movement. Through Rabbi Kleinman's efforts, Camp Swig became a creative and innovative prototype for other Jewish camps in the Reform movement. One model program within Camp Swig was the all-Hebrew-speaking Camp Solael.

Rabbi Kleinman dedicated himself to quality Jewish education for all ages. In his role as Regional Director, he established the Union Hebrew High School, and with enormous pleasure, saw his daughter Sandy complete her Hebrew studies there as a member of the first graduating class. He was the Dean of the Los Angeles College of Jewish Studies, which he had helped organize to train religious school teachers and administrators. Later, at Hebrew Union College, Rabbi Kleinman taught many future rabbis. In 1977, Hebrew Union College conferred upon him an honorary degree as Doctor of Divinity.

Rabbi Kleinman recalled with great satisfaction how as Regional Director, in response to Rose Zucker, the mother of a deaf child, he enthusiastically embraced the undertaking that would result in the creation of the world's first congregation to serve the Jewish hearing-impaired. In 1960, with seed money from the Sisterhood of Wilshire Boulevard Temple, the new congregation was launched. In gratitude, its members named it Temple Beth Solomon of the Deaf in Rabbi Kleinman's honor.

Throughout his long career, Rabbi Kleinman pursued a vigorous social action agenda. He advocated on behalf of farm workers, served on the Inter-Religious Commission on Race and Religion, and participated in the civil rights movement alongside the NAACP's Roy Wilkins.

Rabbi Kleinman returned to the pulpit in 1963 when a group of families came to him to establish Temple Kol Odom in Encino. During his years with Temple Kol Odom, Rabbi Kleinman developed many creative modes of worship. In the late 1960s, with his wife Shirley writing an inspiring service, Selichot was celebrated under the stars at midnight. Heretofore, a service such as this had never taken place in a Reform synagogue.

Rabbi Kleinman came to Temple Ahavat Shalom in 1973 at a time of instability and rabbinic discontinuity, and continued as our senior rabbi until becoming Rabbi Emeritus Solomon F. Kleinman in 1986. A gifted speaker with an enormous sense of dignity and always impeccably dressed, Rabbi Kleinman delivered stirring sermons, often demonstrating a dramatic flair as well as his prodigious intellect. He worked closely with Cantors Ray Roberts, Gary Bachlund and Patti Linsky, along with the choir and organist Bob Mitchell, in providing the finest of Jewish liturgical music during Shabbat and holiday worship.

Bringing the spirit of camp life to the congregation, Rabbi Kleinman initiated a number of unforgettable weekend retreats: several for couples, one for parents and children, and one for the Men of TAS. These weekends of song, study and prayer at various camp sites bound the congregation together in friendship and shared purpose and inspired new leadership. In the mid-1970s, Rabbi Kleinman introduced the Havurah concept to our synagogue, which further strengthened the fabric of congregational life.

Continuing his deep commitment to social action, Rabbi Kleinman galvanized the congregation in several significant endeavors. Under TAS auspices, a Vietnamese "boat" family, the Lams, received financial support and assistance in their adjustment to a new life in the United States. Project Yachad assisted Soviet Jewish families in leaving the U.S.S.R. and emigrating to the U.S.

Rabbi Kleinman awakened TAS, then a small congregation of 250 families, to its potential and articulated a vision for the future, saying that if we did not fulfill our destiny within this community another congregation would come along and seize the moment. He impressed upon TAS the imperative that we look to the future and build a permanent sanctuarysocial hall complex. Writing for the January 1976 issue of the Menorah and having termed the undertaking, "The Possible Dream," he expressed these words: "I know how difficult such a task will surely be. To provide the space we need for worship and study, for communal gatherings and social events, for work and relaxation—for ourselves and our childrenwill demand a labor of love and sacrifice. To do these things will require dedication and determination, and most of all the confidence that the time is now." Soon capital fundraising and architectural committees were formed to make it happen. The doors opened with a special permit for the still incomplete structure, thereby enabling the celebration of the 1978 High Holy Days in our own home. A beautiful service of thanksgiving marked the formal dedication of the sanctuary-



social hall complex in November. Immediately, life at TAS was enormously enhanced as Rabbi Kleinman had foreseen.

Actively shaping adult education, Rabbi Kleinman implemented the first adult B'nai Mitzvah class. He brought many excellent guest speakers to the pulpit, including Rabbis Roland Gittelsohn and David Saperstein and the dynamic Rev. Malcolm Boyd. He inspired several young people in our congregation, including Jason Gwasdoff, Lisa Vernon, Jonathan Klein, and Shawna Brynjegard-Bialik, to become rabbis. Additionally, Rabbi Kleinman mentored a number of student rabbis who served internships at TAS, and he affectionately recalled Stacy Offner and Denise Eger who went on to distinguished careers in the Reform rabbinate. Rabbi Eger is now president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

In the late 1970s, Rabbi Kleinman corresponded with his friend and colleague, Rabbi Albert H. Friedlander of the Westminster Synagogue in London. This congregation had established a repository of Torah scrolls rescued from the Holocaust. That correspondence resulted in our synagogue accepting with great reverence a Torah scroll from one of the decimated synagogues of Czechoslovakia.

Rabbi Kleinman took special pride in recognizing early on the great promise and multiple talents of Rabbi Barry M. Lutz, who shortly after completing his Master's degree at HUC and prior to his ordination, became the director of our religious school.

For many years, Rabbi Kleinman was the only full-time professional at TAS. Yet he tirelessly maintained a high standard of excellence in all aspects of congregational life—education from preschool through confirmation, a rich tapestry of programs, and inspirational worship experiences. Several years before his retirement, Rabbi Kleinman encouraged TAS in a new fund-raiser, the 1983 Pillar of Light Campaign, to complete the sanctuary with the stained glass, eternal light and ark which grace the bimah to this day.

Those who go back to the Kleinman era cannot enter the synagogue without feeling a deep sense of gratitude and full recognition that TAS would not be the congregation it is today without Rabbi Solomon F. Kleinman's inspiring leadership, enormous dedication and vision for the future.

The majority of Jewish immigrants who made their way to the United States between 1820 and 1924 arrived nearly


penniless; yet today, their descendants stand out as exceptionally successful. How can we explain their dramatic economic ascent? Have Jews been successful because of cultural factors distinct to them as a group, or because of the particular circumstances that they encountered in America? *The Rag Race* argues that the Jews who flocked to the United States during the age of mass migration were aided appreciably by their association with a particular corner of the American economy: the rag trade. From humble beginnings, Jews rode the coattails of the clothing trade from the margins of economic life to a position of unusual promise and prominence, shaping

both their societal status and the clothing industry as a whole. Winner of the 2014 National Jewish Book Award

in American Jewish Studies presented by the Jewish Book Council.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank the following business establishments for their baked goods donations: Delicious Bakery and Western Bagel.


