A LETTER FROM GAIL KARLIN



It has been my pleasure and honor to serve as your President for the past 2 ½ years. I have learned so much myself have personally grown through this process. It has been a very rewarding experience which has come with its challenges, accomplishments and its share of sleepless nights. I have developed some wonderful relationships, met people that I may not have had the pleasure to connect with and have

worked closely with an amazing and dedicated Board and Executive Committee.

An email was sent out to the Congregation on November 19, 2015 regarding my resignation as President of Temple Ahavat Shalom effective November 11, 2015 for personal family reasons. I will remain on the Executive Committee through June 30, 2016 as Acting Vice-President overseeing various committees.

My family joined TAS a little more than 19 years ago when my eldest daughter was going into first grade. I didn't know anyone in the Congregation. Our first Rosh Hashanah, my girls were in child care and I attended adult services. I sat next to a couple I had never seen before and by the end of services they asked if our family wanted to join them for lunch. This was the beginning of many wonderful relationships that have had its roots in varying aspects of life at TAS.

I wanted to take this opportunity to focus on some of the accomplishments and changes that have occurred at Temple Ahavat Shalom since I took office in June 2013.

My first year as President the board read the new book by Ron Wolfson "Relational Judaism", each month at the board meeting we discussed a chapter. The focus of the book is on Jewish engagements and exploring 9 levels of relationships. What keeps a place like TAS thriving are the relationships & connections that are developed within this community. During my time as President, we started to reach out to various groups within this community. There were some events to connect with Congregants who are empty nesters, we held a few small dinner parties to hear what this group is looking for in a community. Also, the Gary Rosenthal event in February 2014 was amazing. The ECEC has doubled in size over the past 2 years. We hired a fabulous new ECEC Director the summer of 2014. The Infant Toddler Center that was a concept just a couple of years ago has become a reality. The Toddler program began this fall and the Infant program is scheduled to open February 2016. Our overall membership has remained constant.

This past High Holy Day season we launched a major fundraising campaign. Over the past year a Fund Development committee was formed. The goal was to explore annual giving and change the current culture. It has been a very successful program. We held a Parlor meeting over the summer and the major message was conveyed over High Holy Days resulting in raising funds over \$200,000.

During my Presidency, I have encouraged the board to be more proactive in their personal commitments. Each meeting Board members bring the Sova item of the month. Last year when the annual appeal was sent out, I asked each board member to do what they could to contribute and they responded. It was important for me to be able to say everyone participated. Board members are the leaders of TAS who need to lead by example.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to be your President and I look forward to continuing on the Executive Committee in my new role as Acting Vice-President and have every confidence in Barry Krowne as he assumes the position of Acting President.

NOVEMBER EVENTS

WRJ ASSEMBLY



At the beginning of November, four Sisterhood women (Jackie Zev, Sue Sculler, Phyllis Bigelson and Diane Levine) attended the Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ) Assembly in Orlando Florida. Held in conjunction with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) Biennial conference (which Cantor Rohr and Bob Ingrum attended), it was an excellent conference. The WRJ experience started with a bang – literally! – as the Director of Six Points SciTech Academy (the URJ's Science and Technology summer camp) mixed hydrogen peroxide liquid, water, soap, food coloring and yeast, and the resulting foam shot up out of the beaker some five feet in the air. From there, the activities never slowed – we were moving from 7:00 a.m. each morning until midnight, when the last bus left for our hotel every single day. Highlights include:

• Incredible speakers, including Lilly Ledbetter (her

lawsuit against Goodyear lead to the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, a significant piece of legislation which restores the protection against pay discrimination that was stripped away by the Supreme Court's decision in Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co.), Vice-President Joe Biden, Religious Action Center former director David Sapperstein, NY Times columnist Nicholas Kristof, Rabbi David Wolfman and many, many others.

- Passing resolutions on Pay Equity, Distracted Driving and Paid Family Leave, and making significant bylaws changes, all without running over WRJ's allotted time for plenaries.
- Friday night and Saturday morning services with 5,000 committed Jews, including being able to follow the Torah reading because it was being projected, larger than life, on the screen in front of us.
- Informative and amazingly well-done workshops on topics such as Audacious Hospitality, Pay Equity for Women in the 21st Century, Jewish Women on the Chocolate Trail, Being a Chai Powered Activist and many more.
- Concerts every night with Jewish music superstars such as Julie Silver, Beth Shafer, Peri Smilov, Michelle Citron, Dan Nichols, Josh Nelson, Nechama Carlson and Alan Goodis and singing our voices hoarse in a song session Friday night.
- A marketplace with so much good stuff to buy that it was hard to know what to look at first.

speakers. It has been incredibly busy, and I'm just about fried. I'm sure you are as well.



SPEAKERS PROGRAM

During the summer of 2015, Yiddishkayt's Helix program brought a collection of artists and scholars to Belorus, Latvia, and Lithuania as part of a program of exploration of the world of Yiddish Communities. On December 13, starting around 10am, Artist Benny Fernman, artistic director at De Toledo High School (formerly "New Jew")



in West Hills, will be sharing with us his experiences on the trip.

Benny Ferdman is a visual artist and educator whose work draws from diverse narratives of East European Jewish culture; a culture that once expressed itself in Yiddish—his first language. Born in Sweden after the war to Jewish refugees from Poland/Ukraine, Ferdman



was raised in L.A. and has lived and worked in California, New York and Israel. Focusing on the nexus between nature and culture, Ferdman's journey has led him through broad explorations of diverse cultural realities, to a more intimate engagement with his own East European Jewish traditions and history. His work is animated by a mix of mythic, folkloric and natural forms, ancient text, the past, the present, language, renewal and contradiction. As an artist he is both rooted in, and bound by, these themes. Ferdman is Co-Founder and Artistic Director of Creative Ways, an L.A based organization promoting dialogue across cultures, generations and communities. His adventurous pursuits have brought him arts residencies and commissions for large sculptures, museum exhibitions and installations, stage sets, the redesign of synagogues and cultural centers, and arts-based curricula throughout North America and Israel.

The pre-arranged menu consists of Egg Drop Soup and Egg Roll for appetizers; Steamed Chicken Fillet w/Chinese Greens in light white sauce (Gluten Free), Orange Chicken, Beef Broccoli, Sweet and Sour Chicken, Mixed Vegetable, and Mixed Vegetable Fried Soft Noodle for the entrees; Ice Cream for dessert; Tea and Steamed Rice.

The cost for the dinner is \$22 per person (adult or child); \$24.50 with soft drink. Reservations **must be made by Monday, December 21 at 3:00 p.m.**; there are **no exceptions and no walk-ups**. December 25 is an extremely busy night at the restaurant, and we must pre-reserve our space to avoid the wait. The price is based on the Golden Hunan charge plus tax, gratuity, and online processing fees; this is not a fund-raising event.

 Our monthly Speaker's Meeting on Sunday, January 10 will be the CHP "Age Well, Drive Smart" program. California's older driver population is numbering



about 2.9 million today. It is estimated there will be over four million residents age 65 and older in California by the year 2020. Knowing that much of this community still relies on driving as their primary means



of transportation, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) provides the Age Well, Drive Smart program. The Age Well, Drive Smart talk provides education specifically designed to help older drivers tune up their driving skills, refresh their rules-of-the-road knowledge, learn about normal age-related physical changes and how they affect driving ability. Even if you are under 65 you should attend; you can learn what to watch for when older parents and relatives drive.

RECENT ACTIVITIES

NOVEMBER MONTHLY MEETING

On **Sunday, November 8**, MoTAS had a lively discussion with Hal Daum, who was the first student Rabbi of the newly formed North Valley Reform Temple of Granada Hills after it had spun off of Temple Beth Torah of Arleta. Hal shared a number of stories of NVR's early days, and was joined in the discussion by Max Gottesman and others who were around in the early days.

TEMPLE BETH TORAH FAREWELL CONCERT

As we learned at the November meeting, Temple Ahavat Shalom was created as the merger of North Valley Reform Temple of Granada Hills and Temple Beth Torah of Arleta. We learned that North Valley Reform was formed in 1962 as a splinter from TBT, which itself was formed in 1951. Due to some disagreements, a small cadre of Temple Beth Torah split back out 3 years after the merger, in 1969, and recreated Temple Beth Torah as a smaller close-knit congregation. Last month, Temple Beth Torah announced that after 65 years, Temple Beth Torah was closing its doors. Some members may continue on as a havurah, but


as a formal congregation TBT was ending. TBT's Cantor, Sharone Rosen, and the TBT choir, Kolyenu, are closing out TBT with a final concert, an opportunity to sing their favorites for you. There will be traditional and unusual music from all genres and all over the world, in Hebrew and English. This will also help TBT pay closing costs and final bills.

MoTAS has learned the history of the congregations. Our MoTAS logo states that our purpose is building relationships, and part of that building is repairing relationships. I believe it would be a wonderful gesture for those members of MoTAS who are able to show up for a former part of TAS. 

2016 SUPERBOWL SQUARES

The Men of Temple Ahavat Shalom (MoTAS) announce the 2016 edition of "Super Bowl Squares," the Super Bowl version of our popular "Football Squares" game for the February 7, 2016 Super Bowl. The earnings from this program (potentially as much as \$900) are used to supports special Temple programs and needs; funding that is above and beyond money available from normal TAS budget allowances.

A brief reminder of how the game works:

- 1. There is a chart set up, numbers 0-9 across the top for the NFC champion and 0-9 down the side, for the AFC champion and the numbers are randomly arranged. There are 100 total squares on the board. Your \$18 contribution gives you one square in the grid. As the grid numbers are randomly selected, it makes no difference where your square is.
- 2. Payouts are \$180 for a matching score for home and visitor (determined by the last digit of the score, so 17 is a 7) for each of the first, second, and third quarters. The final score earns \$360. You can win once, twice, or maybe all four times. If the board is not fully subscribed, the payout is proportional based on the number of subscribed squares.
- 3. To address the possibility that all 100 squares might not be subscribed, the following is the procedure for empty squares that win: each player will make a guess as to what the total number of points both teams will score. This number will be used to settle all cases, for all games. If you purchase more than one square your "number" will apply for all your squares. Closest to actual score wins (payouts divided with ties). If there is no halftime winner, the final score prediction will still be used. For example: Superbowl: 28-21 = "49"
- 4. Any adult is eligible to play. A player can reserve up to 3 squares and up to 3 more for their spouse.

Official rules, an on-line signup form, and printable signup forms are on the MoTAS website at http://squares.tasnorthridge-motas.org. Payment must be received by Tuesday, February 2, 2016. Unpaid squares will be cancelled and made available to other participants.

Your support of this program is greatly appreciated. You might win some money, but the Temple is the big winner! A warm "Thank you" from the Men of TAS.

BOOK GROUP WILL DISCUSS MOSSAD: THE GREATEST MISSIONS OF THE ISRAELI SECRET SERVICE BY MICHAEL BAR-ZOHAR AND NISSIM MISHAL ON DECEMBER 10

This book is an absolute page-turner and keeps you on the edge of your seat, a nonfiction book written like


a spy novel. The authors provide 21 chapters describing various Mossad missions. The operations range from the complex assassination of Syrian general Muhammad Suleiman, the kidnapping of Nazi Adolf Eichmann in Argentina, the Israel sponsored emigration of Ethiopian Jews and luring Mordechai Vanunu out of England into Rome as to not suffer the wrath of Thatcher. The book objectively analyzes Mossad's missions, at times bringing to light the criticism Mossad faced for its handling of the missions.

Some of the greatest missions of the Mossad are highlighted, as well as some of the most noteworthy failures that have

tarnished the agency's image. The reader learns how the Mossad undertook its missions - from identifying a mission, to selecting agents, to planning

mission, to selecting agents, to planning and rehearsing the actual undertakings, to their execution. A book to read if you are interested in the world of espionage, intelligence agencies and their missions; an important look into Israel's history. Tyree Wieder will facilitate the discussion.

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


