FRAN KRIMSTON JUBILEE AWARD RECIPIENT



Early in Fran Krimston's career, when she was working as a promotions writer for POPULAR MECHANICS magazine, she published an article on how to build your own vacation home. "I couldn't even pound a nail in straight," she says. "But we don't need to know what we write, do we?"

Nothing could be further from the truth; however, when it comes to her work over the past 25 years as Editor of the TAS Menorah. Few could boast knowing more about a congregation and the issues it faces. Fran is a former two-term president—the first woman to serve in that capacity, a longtime board member, past president of Sisterhood, chair of the havurah and worship committees and a member of the long-range planning committee. She has worked on countless committees and projects, and writes the cards for the Caring Community in tandem with Susie Bierman.

Subsequent leadership opportunities have allowed her to learn about and influence Jewish life and the Reform Movement on both a regional and national scale.

Raised in the small town of Michigan City, Indiana, Fran was editor of her high school newspaper and president of her temple youth group. She headed off to Indiana University at Bloomington to study journalism, moved to Chicago to work and met her husband Monte, of blessed memory. A honeymoon to the West Coast convinced the couple to relocate.

After serving as TAS president, Fran was invited to join both the regional and national boards of the URJ, and she became a leadership trainer for temple boards around the country. Fran also served on the Editorial Board of REFORM JUDAISM magazine for 20 years.

Fran recently left Hillside Memorial Park, where she worked for 19 years as a Family Sales Counselor. Prior to that she was an editor at the LA Daily News. Currently, she belongs to Brandeis and Hadassah and is a volunteer at the Skirball Museum. She is an enthusiastic Jazzercizer, theatre attendee, plays mah jongg and is looking for a bowling league.

She is the mother of member Joan Krimston, who teaches Israeli dancing during Religious School and is chair of the Caring Community. Joan is married to captain of the TAS Bagel Dawgs softball team, David Korduner. Fran's son Josh, a firefighter paramedic, lives and works in San Diego, where he, his wife Celine, and their sons belong to Temple Emanu-El. Joan and Josh grew up at TAS, where they were confirmed, and Josh celebrated his Bar Mitzvah. Both Krimston kids were campers and staffers at Camp Swig. Joan and David were married on our beautiful bima.

Fran is the grandmother of Zachary, Benjamin, Jordan, Jacob and Noah. "Having my kids and grandkids here is the whipped cream on my sundae", she says.

received a BS in Business. Sue went to work as a teacher at Roscoe Elementary School, and Paul went on to the USC School of Law. Sharon and her family have been supporters of TAS for 43 years. Hailing from Detroit, Sharon's strong sense of giving back to the community was instilled in her early. "I grew up with a mother

who taught me, you give back when people are kind to you," said Sharon. Sharon's first husband Lee served as Temple photographer for many years. SARAH LONDER LEGACY AWARD RECIPIENT

A TAS member for 28 years, Sarah Londer credits her devotion to social action to those who came before her. "These are the people who inspired me to do what I do," she commented. She named Bonnie

Weissman, Efrat Yakobi, Rhonda Mayer, Sue Issler, Susan Pollack (of blessed memory), Loren Lieb, Donna Finkelstein, Barry and Wendy Krowne and Becky Breuer. Her husband Barry also supported and encouraged her along the way.

As Fran Rosenfield lay dying, she called Sarah to come visit. "Fran made me promise I would continue to make sure that every unfortunate child had a present to open for the holidays."

Sarah has been involved with the Brady Campaign (Formerly Million Mom March) since its inception in 2000. She has campaigned for common sense gun laws and takes pride in California's gun laws, the strictest in the country.

Her temple activities also include the Board of Education, the Purim Carnival, Mitzvah Day, the blood drive and the Board of Trustees. Professionally, Sarah is a partner in a family real estate investment business.

One of six sisters, Sarah grew up at Wilshire Boulevard Temple, and Barry grew up at Temple Akiba in Culver City. They have always been involved in Reform synagogue life. Their three children grew up at TAS and celebrated B'nai Mitzvah and Confirmations. Sarah said, "Belonging to and supporting a synagogue is part of our DNA."



MAX LUPUL LEGACY AWARD RECIPIENT

Max's journey to the North Valley took him from Romania, where he was born, to Israel, where his family escaped the war in 1941. (Max spoke five languages, none of them Hebrew.) In 1951, he was accepted

at UC Berkeley where he studied business and marketing. It

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was at Berkeley Hillel over a meal of kosher hot dogs that he met Ruth Werner, born in Roundup, Montana, where there were a handful of Jews.

Max and Ruth married, moved to Los Angeles, and Max got a job teaching Marketing at UCLA. In 1964, he was asked to join the Marketing Department at CSUN as department chair. Max retired in 1992.

The Lupuls settled in Northridge and became part of the founding member group at TAS. It was discovered that Max had the skills to produce the weekly newsletter, even then called the MENORAH. He typed it, helped lay it out and stenciled it. It was mailed each Sunday to 170 households.

Max served on the Board of Directors many times, and he and Ruth have been active on countless committees. His favorite pastime was fixing things. "It gave me a chance to be creative," he said. Max and past president, Gary Himler, became the Fix-It Guys. Temple members called them for all kinds of home remedies—from computer fixes to appliance repairs. There was no charge, but the Fix-It Guys requested a donation be given to the Temple in the amount the homeowner felt the job was worth.

Max was a valued member of the Building and Grounds committee and was responsible for many major purchases and upgrades over the years.

"We have stayed involved all of these years, because this is our community. My Dad taught me that it is our tradition to support our shul. Also, the close relationship that we had with Bess and Gary Himler and so many others has kept us involved."

Early on, according to Max, Rabbi Alan Secher stopped by to drop off the Menorah and mentioned to Max that he did not see him at services often. Max told him he was not religious. Rabbi Secher said, "By the devotion you show to this congregation you are religious."



SHEILA REBACK LEGACY AWARD RECIPIENT

A legend in North Valley preschool history, Sheila has served the community with dedication and verve for more than 30 years. As the creator /director of Adventures in Learning, she enjoyed preparing

toddlers and young children for elementary school for 15 years. That was followed by another 15 years at the North Valley Jewish Community Center. She has touched the lives of hundreds of children, many of them who have also passed through the doors of TAS.

She served on the board for five years, was chair of Religious Practices and currently is Hospitality Chair. She has worked

with the Synaplex committee for nine years, as well as High Holy Days, 50th Anniversary, Purim carnival and the ECEC board, where she developed the "Let's Read Together" program. You will find her helping out in the preschool and attending Bim Bam Bima. Sheila says she has ordered hundreds of challahs and thousands of cookies for Onegs, and her talent shines when she sets up beautiful receptions for special events.

In her spare time (really!), Sheila worked at the Stein Mart boutique for 12 years, and currently she volunteers in the Admissions Department at the Jewish Home for the Aging. She created a program for residents of the Jewish Home, which includes van transportation to Stein Mart where they meet with their own personal shopper.

Sheila said, "My love of TAS and its members, my love of Judaism and the need to ensure its continuity, along with my passion for early childhood learning motivates me to continue the work that needs to be done."

Sheila is the loving mother of Leslie and Mark and the incredibly proud grandmother of eight, one of whom has made Aliyah.



JEWISH RAMBLINGS BY BRIAN HATKOFF ORIGINALLY POSTED ON FEBRUARY 15, 2016

I ASKED THE QUESTION OF MEN FROM AROUND THE COUNTRY:

"What does Jewish Fatherhood mean to you?" It could be your relationship with your kids. It could be your relationship with your father. What have you done that makes it important to be a Jewish father? Does it mean something to you or does it even make a difference?

Some of the answers I received were very interesting.

One man answered: "Jewish fatherhood is setting a good example for your children. That they should see you treat others well. That you show them the importance of living a life that is informed by Jewish values. That you show by example the value of learning, living a life guided by a loving heart and the importance of tzedakah."

Another man answered: "Jewish fatherhood means to me the transference & upholding of our Jewish roots and customs to our children and what it means."

One man coined a phrase from the Jewish War Veterans: "Being a citizen is more than a birthright. It means to me, the love & defense of my country & the right & dignity of my spiritual & personal beliefs."

A man from the east coast: "I am not a father. And my father was not very Jewish. I can tell you what it is like to be Jewish over the objections of your father and what I really missed."

THIS IS FROM A JEW BY CHOICE:

"Forty-six years ago I converted to Judaism: it was a conscious choice, not an obligation before marriage. Once our two boys were of the age to attend Hebrew School there was mutual agreement between Linda and me that each would attend, no questions asked. Our insistence that each would become a Bar Mitzvah, continue with Confirmation, and Youth Group was accepted as "normal," rather than punitive. Our boys have had the advantage of enjoying their progress as young Jewish men, while I have delighted in their being comfortable in their Jewishness. The fact that now, at the age of 28 and 32, they have not yet reconnected with the "religious" aspects of their upbringing does not worry me: the foundation is there and, when they choose to, they will select what they need.

This is all by way of saying that, for me, my connections with what I have gotten from my identity as a Jew has been easily transferred to what I believe should be a given for any father whose life finds delight both in his heritage and in his sons."

ANOTHER JEW BY CHOICE:

"This is a very interesting question for me as I raised two children as a non-Jewish father and one child as a Jewish father. What were the differences? It is really hard to put my finger on major differences beyond taking my child to temple instead of church, celebrating Hanukkah instead of Christmas and talking about Bat Mitzvah and Confirmation instead of Baptism and Confirmation. I would say that the difference wasn't in what I did or taught my children, rather it was in me. As a Jew, I truly felt like the difference I made was in doing, rather than believing. My emphasis was on today, not eternal life."

A MAN FROM THE MIDWEST:

"The importance of our Jewish identity was always related to our children. Both our boys went through confirmation and then Hebrew High School. Both boys after the 10th grade went on the NFTY trips to Israel. We attended services most Friday nights. For thirty years we belonged to a Havurah to augment family Jewish holidays.

When our younger son went off to college, every Wednesday for three years we UPSed him a chalah; except for those Sunday mornings when Steven made Challah French Toast for his fraternity. On those occasions we would ship him 12 challahs.

Now both boys are married with families of their own and are establishing their own Jewish traditions.

To me, being a good Jewish father, as opposed to just being a good Jew is about being a role model for your children in a way which sets an example for them as eventual Jewish adults and practicing traditionally male rituals. Some things are obviously Jewish – blessing the children on Shabbat, building a sukkah, ushering at services. Others are not specifically male or Jewish, but are valuable to be seen by children – giving tzedakah, visiting the sick, and other mitzvot. Even everyday activities are important examples for children to see from their father – loving your spouse, working hard at your job every day, and being industrious. Actions speak louder than words, particularly with children; if you "act" Jewish, hopefully so will your children."

AND FINALLY FROM ME:

"Hopefully as a Jewish father, I have instilled a life of values, customs and traditions based in the Jewish tradition by example and that my kids as adults embrace their heritage."

"Fathers and Sons"



As I write this post/article, I have just received word that Scott Yollis' father passed away. He's not alone: in March, other men in the congregation have lost fathers or fathers-in-law, including Mike Doner and Rabbi Lutz. It is also just after my father's birthday;

he passed away in 2004. Fathers play important roles in our lives: they pass down values, they serve as examples, they teach us how to lead. Our congregation is blessed with many active fathers, including the men of MoTAS and the fathers in our religious school.

One problem we have, however, is a generational gap between the fathers in the congregation. Although we all share the same goal — leadership in our family and leadership for the congregation — there is a sense that we have little in common. The older dads form the core constituency of MoTAS. The younger dads are involved in the ECEC and activities like "Dad's Night Out." When we should be crosspollinating our similar experiences, we separate and think we have little in common.

MoTAS would like to change that. First, we invite the younger dads to come to our Sunday morning meetings (timed to be during religious school), our MoTAS Seder, and our upcoming outing to see the Lancaster Jethawks — affordable, family-friendly baseball. We also want to work with the dad's group in the ECEC — providing umbrella publicity, and working together to promote fundraisers for our groups and the congregation. 



this time together. Please know that we would love for





THE SPINOZA PROBLEM BY IRVIN YALOM; ED EDELSON, FACILITATOR

It has been written that of all the philosophers of the seventeenth-century, perhaps none have more relevance today than Spinoza. Join this month's book discussion and discover why.

"The more we acquire the more we crave, and the deeper our sadness when our yearning is not satisfied. Lads, listen to me: If you crave happiness, do not waste your life struggling for that which you really do not need." - Baruch Spinoza

This month, the Book Group will discuss the story of a connection between a 17C Dutch Jewish thinker and a World War II Nazi ideologue. In 1910 when 16-year-old Alan Rosenberg is called into his headmaster's office for anti-Semitic remarks, he is forced, as punishment, to memorize passages about Spinoza from the autobiography of the German poet Johann Goethe. As an adult, Rosenberg remains haunted by the thought that his idol, Goethe, would



have been inspired by a member of a race he considers so inferior to his own.

Irvin Yalom imagines the unexpected intersection of Spinoza's life with Rosenberg's as he explores the mindsets of two men separated by 300 years. Using his skills as a psychiatrist, he explores how the inner lives of Spinoza, the Jewish secular philosopher, and Rosenberg, the godless mass murderer, came to intersect based on Goethe's admiration of Spinoza. This is one of Yalom's best-reviewed novels.

This is a discussion you will not want to miss. Join us on Thursday, April 7 in the Rothenberg Chapel/Library. We begin at 7:00 p.m. for coffee and start the discussion at 7:30 p.m. Feel free to join us even if you have not read the book, the discussion may inspire you to do so!

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


