FROM THE DESK OF RABBI BARRY M. LUTZ. R.J.E.

I used to have an Oscar the Grouch alarm clock. My sister gave it to me. It's probably not necessary to explain why. Okay, so I'm not always in the best mood before my morning Coffee Bean cup.

All of which got me to thinking about being thankful. I mean, we have a national holiday celebrating "thanks." As Jews we are told to begin each morning with, "Modim anachnu lach" - "We are so grateful." In America, November is a month for giving thanks for the many people that bless our lives. Gratitude is such an important part of living a Jewish life. We are to say, modeh/modah ani - "I am so grateful" when we wake up in the morning. We are asked to say one hundred blessings a day. This is not to fulfill some scorecard. Rather, if you felt obligated to say thank you one hundred times a day, think of all the things that you currently take for granted for which you would have to say, "thank you." In our prayers we say, "thank you" for creation, "thank you" for Torah, "thank you" for Freedom.



Imagine how things would change you if you said, "thank you," all the time! Imagine waking up and saying, "I am so grateful" as the very first thing you say in the morning. Imagine how it would change you if you said, "thank you" for my body, "thank you" for this rain, "thank you" for this food...Imagine consciously taking on an "attitude of gratitude." Imagine waking up as Elmo rather than Oscar. (Okay, maybe Elmo is a tad annoying, but you get the idea.)

I was recently reading an article about The Tonight Show's host, Jimmy Fallon, and his amazing charisma. They spoke about his positive attitude and joyful spirit. How his "attitude of gratitude" makes others gravitate to him. You want to watch him because he makes you feel better. His laughter and joy put you at ease.

You know, it is a conscious choice. You don't have to save it all up for one day a year. Try it. Slowly. One step at a time. Repeat after me: "modim anachnu lach" - "I am grateful." See that wasn't so hard. You'll find yourself becoming happier and your life feeling just a little lighter. You can always sound your Oscar the Grouch alarm clock when you need a good laugh.

FRANKLY SPEAKING

Shanah Tova!

Each Friday morning, Frieda filled two shopping bags. Inside were the results of her pre-dawn preparations—containers of rich chicken soup with matzo balls that floated; warm, artfully-braided challahs; kugels studded with raisins; and her famous strudel, a true labor of love.

All of these she generously distributed to the sick and poor Jews of our small Indiana town, adding a few dollars at every stop. It was usually mid-afternoon by the time my exhausted grandmother walked to our house to say, "Kinderlach, please call me a cab, and you need to pay the driver because I gave away all my money."



My grandparents were not rich, but grandma gave all she had. There was a family joke about grandma's selflessness. Each Yom Tov she wore the same sensible navy straw hat

with a tiny veil to services. Every year Grandpa Jake would say, "Nu, Frieda, I gave you extra money for a new hat. Where is it?" And every year the reply was something like, "Izzy Bernath needed dentures" or "Harry Kramer's car broke down," or....well, you get the picture.

Frieda Lieber remains my quintessential role model. She was her own caring community.

When funds were needed for my childhood Sinai Temple, Frieda and Jake stepped up. They knew it was incumbent upon them to ensure the Temple would be there for generations to come. If not them, who? And if not now, when?

Growing up in Michigan City, Indiana, I learned early on about the value of community. Our small, but dedicated congregation of 200 families—every single Jew in town belonged—was the center of our lives. It might not surprise you to know that I served as president of the Temple's BBYO chapter and the student council.

My parents, Vi and David Lieber of blessed memory, spent countless hours there—not just praying, but doing everything in their power to make sure the community would survive.

My mom was a tireless worker for our Temple's Sisterhood where there was never a bakery made cake or cookie. She served as president of the Temple's Hadassah chapter where she was passionately dedicated to Youth Aliyah, the project that brought the orphaned children, remnants of the holocaust, to Israel.

Many a night, the phone would ring just as we sat down to dinner, and my father was called to a Minyan on the anniversary of someone's death. He never said no. He and my mother taught me that when the chips are down, your synagogue community will be there to lift you up.

When Monte and I left the Midwest and bought a home in Granada Hills, I found my Sinai Temple on Chimineas Street. It has been my family's spiritual and communal home for 45 years.

This is where our children attended Sunday and Hebrew school, celebrated Bar Mitzvah, Confirmations and where Joan and David chose to have their wedding. All three of their boys have had their Bar Mitzvah services on this bema. Josh and Celine chose a Reform Synagogue near their San Diego home for their family's Jewish connection.





When my folks moved from the Midwest to be close to their grandchildren, they joined TAS. It brings me great joy to see the beautifully restored chuppah on which Vi Lieber embroidered some of the pomegranates and flourishes.

It was here, tucked into this corner of Northridge where I found lifelong friends, a loving havurah, a place to continue to learn and grow spiritually and strengthen my ties to the Jewish community; where my children participated in the youth group and, through membership in a URJ Synagogue, had the opportunity and privilege to attend Camp Swig for many years; where lifelong friendships were forged and Jewish identity was enriched.

When Monte became ill with cancer six years ago, this congregation supported us in a myriad of ways.

Monte was a skillful scrabble and boggle player. During his final months while I was at work, many of you came to bring lunch and play word games with him. It was incredibly thoughtful and added immeasurably to the quality of his remaining days.

Our house was filled with many of you for our Shiva Minyanim, bringing comfort and caring to our family.

Rabbi Lutz and Rabbi Kleinman provided the warm and personal remembrances that touched our hearts and only come from real connections to a Rabbi and a synagogue like ours.

In case you can't tell, I love this place. I treasure this community. I want to see it continue for generations to come.

It pains me deeply when I hear people say they left the Temple because they no longer "use" it. This is not a filling station where you drop off your kids for Jewish education, then leave when they are filled up. If we do not ensure the future, what will be left for the generations that follow?

As you have heard, a significant percentage of our congregants need financial support. Each year we must count on you for extra funding to provide all children with a rich Jewish education, to continue our adult education programming, and to be a sanctuary to celebrate, mourn and grow with one another.

So, now I ask you to join me in ensuring that future by getting involved, recommitting yourself to social justice, becoming part of the community and joining me by being part of the Count Me In campaign. We are so grateful to those of you who have already stepped up.

I pray that the spirit of the eternal is in our hearts as we rededicate ourselves to this community. And may it be so—*Keyn ye hi ratzon*.

NOVEMBER B'NAI MITZVAH SPOTLIGHT: SHAYNA RABIN



This is the first in a series of articles featuring interviews with the B'nai Mitzvah class of 2016-2017. We hope that you will get to know about our wonderful new Jewish adults, and welcome them into your own family, as part of the extended TAS family we all belong to.

"Always question. Always wonder." These words, written by Lois Lowry, one of Shayna's favorite authors, sums up her way of looking at the world. Her father describes her as tenacious, motivated, and driven. When she takes on a project, there is no doubt that it will be completed, successfully, and earlier than "on time." Reminding her to do something is not part of the family vocabulary.

Shayna is the daughter of Laura and Michael Rabin. She has an older brother, Stephen, and a younger "sibling," 5-year-old Riley, a yellow Labrador Retriever. She attends Nobel Charter Middle School, where she is involved in leadership, an elective which helps plan, organize and carry out activities to enhance and support student life. This gives her great satisfaction, knowing she is helping others. She says she is very "hands on." Her favorite subjects are Math and English.

When not in school, she has played AYSO and club soccer. She also enjoys reading and singing. Shayna sang in the Children's Choir for several years here at TAS. She is driven to learn more about her career choice. When asked the typical question of "what do you want to be when you grow up," she said her Plan B is to be an Interior Designer, so she reads everything she can on the field, and watches television stations which feature shows about it. Her philosophy is the more I can know about it, the better. What is her Plan A? She would really love to become a professional soccer player, either as a goalie or a striker. Watch out, US National Team...here comes Shayna.

The Rabin family has been at TAS for twelve years, with Shayna starting at the ECEC. After her Bat Mitzvah, Shayna will continue her formal Jewish education at least through Confirmation.

Inspired by her love for Riley, and appalled at the misery imposed on some animals, Shayna has decided to support the ASPCA for her Mitzvah Project. In addition to a bake sale to raise funds, she is also asking friends, family, and others to participate in a walk or run drive, in which you walk however far or long you want, which is recorded by a computer application, and for which a corporate sponsor will contribute money based on your effort. For which high school she will attend, Shayna is on the fence. There are things about Granada she loves, and there are things about Cleveland she loves, and both offer programs the other one doesn't. She welcomes suggestions to assist her in her choice. This thoughtfulness makes Shayna the bright, inquisitive, optimistic person she is.

Her advice to her fellow B'nai Mitzvah class: Don't give up when it gets hard (and it will get hard), keep practicing (even if learning the trope drives your family crazy), and start early.



COUPONS FOR MILITARY FAMILIES



MEN OF TEMPLE AHAVAT SHALOM (MoTAS)

It was seven something on a cloudy Sunday morning when I pulled into the TAS parking lot. I wondered if tables were set up, coffee brewed and food cooked. I held tight to my coffee mug and headed to the Social Hall. Aaron, Jose and staff were moving chairs and tables, and vacuuming. In the kitchen men were talking loud and laughing. We promised a pancake breakfast for over two hundred kids, parents and teachers, but nothing was ready.

Bill navigated an electric hand mixer through lumpy batter. Scott flipped flap jacks on the griddle. He diligently checked temperatures with an infrared thermometer. "Using twenty-first century micro-electronics to monitor a 1950's gas grill?" I asked. Before he could answer another voice shouted "all the percolators are cold!" We had tripped a circuit breaker and did not know where it was.

"Are there anymore?" I'd seen these kids' faces before. How much could they eat? We'd cooked over six hundred fluffy flap jacks, spread ten pounds of real whipped butter and poured a gallon of no high fructose corn syrup Log Cabin maple. He and his friends could see the answer in my face, they smiled at me. "That's okay mister, the ones we had were good."

We heard the chime of Rabbi Lutz's twelve string and went outside. Cantor Ken added a rocking rhythm and we all started singing. The kids smiled, parents smiled and everyone smiled. Those magical happy feelings that come from music and worship flowed through all of us. Another generation is filled with magical happy memories of worship and learning.

It was my first Men's Club meeting as President. While Roger was giving the treasurer's report, I was trying to get my new sound system to work. Barry started talking about highlights of the fun time folks had at our golf tournament. I was stressed and starting to sweat. I had promised to present videos of an Oxford Union Society Debate. The topic: Who is the greater obstacle to peace in the Middle East, Israel or Hamas? The left speaker was dead. Daniel talked about The Music of Allan Sherman and upcoming events. The right speaker came to life! We watched and listened to Dennis Prager, "Hamas is a greater obstacle to peace than Israel." Then the opposing side, Mishana Hosseinioun, "Hamas is Not a Greater Obstacle to Peace Than Israel."

If you liked tinker toys, you'll love our Sukkah. Just imaging those green sticks and wooden circles. Now replace them with seven foot long by one inch diameter steel pipes and steel couplers. We each stood holding a steel pole with Bob Levin directing us on how to assemble them. We joked around. The sense of respect and brotherhood was immediate. We're all Jewish men experiencing tradition, making tradition, and teaching by example. A few guys start doing things their own way, but that's not important now, because I smelled bagels. Bob Levine, yes a different Bob, went to the Western Bagel main bakery on Sepulveda and brought them back still hot! They were high gluten heaven.






