When Ronna and Lew Edgers, moved to Northridge from Boston, one of their first tasks was to find a temple for their young family. Friendly and outgoing as they were, it did not take long before they became immersed in the TAS community—Lew served on the Board, and Ronna was co-Sisterhood president. Debby and her sister Judy Alban spent countless hours at the temple. Debby recalls the lone building plunked down close to Chimineas Street where religious and Hebrew school took place during the day, and on Shabbat, the multipurpose space was transformed into a sanctuary.

Debby expressed, "I cannot remember a time when temple was not central to my family's life. It would not feel right if TAS was not a focal point. It is especially





Alas, the time has come...time for Barb to head to Virginia Beach, VA, and live with her loving husband of three years--Kenny Weinstein. Time to enjoy the home there that Kenny has established for them. Time to find meaningful work in the town that will become her permanent home. Barb and Kenny met on a blind date in 2007, became engaged in 2012 and were married in November of 2014. In all of that time they never lived in the same city. Barb jokes that in the early days of their

BOOK GROUP SELECTION FOR MAY 11 MEETING: MY GRANDFATHER WOULD HAVE SHOT ME - A BLACK WOMAN DISCOVERS HER FAMILY'S NAZI PAST BY JENNIFER TEEGE AND NIKOLA SELLMAIR

"I am the granddaughter of Amon Goeth, who shot hundreds of people—and for being black, he would

have shot me, too." Teege is a German-Nigerian woman —married, with two small children—when by chance she finds a library book about her grandfather, Amon Goeth. Millions of people worldwide know of him through Ralph Fiennes' chilling portrayal in Steven Spielberg's film *Schindler's List*. Responsible for the deaths of thousands, Amon Goeth was hanged in 1946.

Goeth's partner Ruth, Teege's much-loved grandmother, committed suicide in 1983. Teege is their daughter's daughter; her

father is Nigerian. Raised by foster parents, she grew up with no knowledge of the family secret. Now, it unsettles her profoundly. What can she say to her Jewish friends, or to her own children? Who is she—truly?

This is her searing chronicle of grappling with her haunted past. Her research into her family takes her

to Poland and to Israel. Award-winning journalist Nikola Sellmair supplies historical context in a separate, interwoven narrative. Step by step, horrified by her family's dark history, Teege builds the story of her own liberation.

important to me that so many remember my parents and often share their memories of them with me."

Debby has fond memories of the Chutzpah Club, organized and led with verve by Elaine Gottesman, of blessed memory. Debby served as recording secretary, and she was very proud that her minutes were published in the Menorah each month. There was Hebrew training with Sonia Liberman, her Bat Mitzvah with Rabbi Kleinman officiating and her Confirmation and wedding, officiated by Rabbi Brown. The beautiful Sisterhood chuppah hanging in the sanctuary was held aloft when Debby married Mark Lieber in December of 1990.

Mark, who was born in Montreal, celebrated his Bar Mitzvah at Temple Ramat Zion, graduated from Monroe High School, then went on to CSUN and Southwestern Law School, where he and Debby met. She was looking for a tutor for her Constitutional Law class, and Mark made a recommendation. This introduction not only helped Debby pass her exam, but it formed the foundation for their successful team. Together they created Lieber and Lieber Law Group, a plaintiff's personal injury firm with a focus on representing individuals injured from accidents, defective products, medical malpractice, school bullying and employment discrimination and harassment. Their partnership also resulted in two fabulous sons.

Jonathan, 20, a sophomore at University of Oregon and a member of a Jewish fraternity and Ben, 17, a junior at Santa Susana High School, attended the ECEC, and celebrated their Bar Mitzvah and Confirmation on the TAS bimah, where their parents were married. Both boys, Debby confirmed, have strong Jewish identities, fueled, she believes, because temple has always been part of their lives. "Social justice is part of who they are, and it creates a positive influence in a world filled with negativity," said Debby.

Debby has served on every committee except Budget and Finance. A few years ago she decided to don her mother's choir robe and join the TAS choir, which she has come to love. In addition to serving as a vice president on the TAS Board of Trustess she also is a vice president of Ben's school PTSA, she enjoys mah jongg, travel, Zumba classes, reads several books a week and is a skilled networker.

Mark has a group of friends who met when they were just six years old and with whom he plays poker and golf regularly. He enjoys following all of the LA sports teams, delving into international and domestic politics and loves spending time with his family. He noted, "I am often asked if I mind that Debby attends so many meetings," he said, "actually, it allows me to watch all the sports on TV without guilt." Now that is a supportive husband!

Mark noted, "The Gala is a great honor, but it is not about me—it is all about Debby. Someone has to provide leadership at temple, and who better to do it than people who have been there so long and love it so much."

Debby added, "It feels a little peculiar to be honored. You might be surprised to know that I do not like being in the limelight, but it is invigorating, inspiring and humbling to be acknowledged."

courtship when she visited Kenny in Virginia Beach, she was given a drawer. Later she got part of closet, and now she will have an entire house.

Although born in Scranton, PA, the entire Gelb clan, which included Barb's five siblings, saddled up and moseyed on out to Laramie, Wyoming, where her father joined the faculty of the Law School at the University of Wyoming. They lived in Laramie for 18 years.

A student at an Orthodox day school in Scranton, Barb's life in Wyoming was-- in the truest sense-- culture shock. She relished the slow pace of the town of 25,000, with a total of 70 Jews. There was a temple in Cheyenne, but the Gelbs became the spokespersons and teachers for the Jews of Laramie. "I became a Jewish educator when I was 13," Barb said, "I taught Hebrew and Jewish songs, and with my Mom, and siblings we taught and helped kids through their bar mitzvahs."

Barb participated in ballet, played softball and basketball and enjoyed the freedom of living in a small town. When she came west to UCLA, the campus population was more than Laramie's! She majored in psychology, and as student chairperson of the United Jewish Fund, she was sent on a mission to Israel. She has worked with Hillel at Pierce and Valley colleges and was Adult Program Director at the North Valley JCC. Barb went on to earn double masters degrees from Hebrew Union College and USC in Jewish Communal Service and Social Work.

Along the way, she managed to have three brilliant and talented children. Zoe, 22, works in theatre in Springfield, MO; Elijah, 20, is completing his education at San Diego State; and Jacob, 18, will graduate from the Van Nuys Performing Arts Magnet in June and will be pursuing a BFA in acting.

When her children were 7, 5 and 3, she was offered a job in Memphis as Director of Education at Temple Israel. After a rich and successful tenure of ten years, the family decided to come back to Southern California. The kids wanted to go to school here, and her parents were retiring to San Diego.

During her four years at TAS, our Director of Lifelong Learning (DOLL) has enriched the programs of both the religious and Hebrew schools, but she has also created a well-rounded adult ed program, and, with Tessa Cramer and Rabbi Lutz, she literally pulled the pre-school from the ashes and made it flourish.

"I have loved my time at TAS. Sometimes I forget it is a job. From the ECEC to the Adult Ed program, I love the people and am impressed by the dedicated leadership," she said.

We are incredibly grateful to Barb for her dedication, her creativity, and for the friendship and warmth she has extended to our families. May she be blessed as she goes on her way.
