NEW TAS PRESIDENT

Jerry Hilecher, our new TAS president, grew up in St. Louis, Missouri. He and his wife, Marcy, met about 32 years ago, at the St. Louis Jewish Community Center gym, while working out. They soon decided to get married and keep working it out for life. They have been married for 29 years. In 1989, Marcy got a job offer and they moved to the Valley.

Jerry played professional racquetball and, in 1981, he was a world champion at the age of 27, which brought him both a financial reward and the accomplishment of a goal. He played for about 15 years, professionally, and was in the top four for 10 years, retiring a few years after they moved here. Although not a professional player anymore, he still plays. Two years ago, he was in the National Doubles Championships in the men's 55+category.

Jerry and Marcy have three grown children. Their son, Matthew, 26, is a film editor for Trailer Park, a company that produces film trailers enticing people to go see the actual film. Older daughter Sara, 24, works in the field of leadership training as a facilitator. Younger daughter Jahmie, 21, is a professional dancer and choreographer.

Jerry and Marcy have been temple members for about 20 years, which started when Marcy got a part-time job as a youth director at TAS. Temple membership followed, and then came Jerry's involvement in the Men's Club, now called MoTAS. After entering the golf tournament, he ended up running it. He eventually attained the

positions of vice president and president of MoTAS. He was vice president of the board for nine years and is now temple president.

Jerry owns a company called Gateway TelNet, selling telecommunications and business phone equipment. Marcy is an independent contractor, working as a meeting planner, arranging meetings and conventions for such organizations as AIPAC and Women of Reform Judaism. When asked what he does in his spare time, Jerry says, "What spare time?" No doubt, running a business, being temple president and head of a family keep him busy enough.

Jerry's philosophy of life has been shaped by what he has accomplished. Racquetball was the microcosm of his life, and he learned to do whatever needed to be done to succeed. 
SEPT. 14 - "SASHENKA." BY SIMON MONTEFIORE



An adolescent schoolgirl from a privileged family of Jewish lineage, whose ideas of politics and revolution come from novels, Sashenka Zeitlin comes face face with reality when she is arrested by czarist secret police in 1916 St. Petersburg, Russia. She becomes a double agent. By 1939, Sashenka has become a mother, married to a Communist official, living

in relative ease and unscathed by Stalin's purges of 1937 and 1938. She embarks on a forbidden love affair, which will have devastating consequences. Sashenka's legacy cannot be put to rest. Montefiore's command of Russian history weaves a dramatic tale.

OCT. 12 - "GIANT OF THE SENATE," BY AL FRANKEN



This is a book about an unlikely campaign that had an even more improbable ending: the closest outcome in history and an unprecedented eight-month recount saga, which is pretty funny in retrospect. It's a book about what happens when the nation's foremost progressive satirist gets a chance to serve in the United States

Senate and, defying the low expectations of the pun-

dit class, actually turns out to be good at it. It's a book about our deeply polarized, frequently depressing, occasionally inspiring political culture, written from inside the belly of the beast.

NOV. 9 - "LEAVING LUCY PEAR." BY ANNA SOLOMON



One night in 1917, Beatrice Haven sneaks out of her uncle's house on Cape Ann, Mass., leaves her newborn baby at the foot of a pear tree, and watches as another woman claims the infant as her own. The unwed daughter of wealthy Jewish industrialists, and a gifted pianist bound for Radcliffe, Bea plans to leave her shameful secret behind and make a fresh

start. Ten years later, she returns to her uncle's house, seeking refuge from her unhappiness. But she discovers far more when the rum-running manager of the local quarry inadvertently reunites her with Emma Murphy, the headstrong Irish-Catholic woman who has been raising Bea's abandoned child — now a bright, bold, cross-dressing girl named Lucy Pear, with secrets of her own.

SISTERHOOD NEWS AND A CRUISE: AND YOU THOUGHT HANUKKAH IS ONLY 8 NIGHTS?

Sisterhood is hard at work planning all of our programs for the year. We have general meetings, religious observance events, fundraisers, leadership training events and programs to help our youth, our temple and our community. We hope you will participate in some of our programs this year.

Here are the dates of our general meetings and our religious observance events for the 2017-2018 year. Mark your calendars!

Our Sept. general meeting will be Thursday, Sept. 14, when David Kleinbrodt, a podiatrist at Kaiser Permanente, will educate us on how to take care of our feet and how to prevent foot pain, important for better mobility. David will teach us to treat our feet right.

Our annual Sukkot in the Sukkah will be Thursday, Oct. 5, and our annual paid-up luncheon will be Thursday, Nov. 12. We have a great speaker for the paid-up luncheon who will tell us all about how the Jewish immigrant experience has played a role in American theater. If you like theater, you will enjoy this presentation.

In December, we always celebrate Hanukkah. We hate to say goodbye to Hanukkah, so this year our celebration will be on the "10th night" of Hanukkah, Thursday, Dec. 21.

January and February will have some very interesting programs of general interest to all. In January, we are looking into doing a presentation on tax preparation Thursday, Jan. 18, and in February we want to explore gender identity (date to be determined). Our fabulous annual Women's Seder will be Thursday, March 15 – this is always a sold-out event. In April, we are planning a celebration of Israel, with Israeli foods and activities, on Thursday, April 19. Our Sisterhood Shabbat will be Friday, May 11, and our last general meeting of the

year will be Thursday, May 17, when we will have Efrat Yakobi leading us in storytelling.

And wait, there's more! Our first Mahjongg Tournament of the year is Sunday, Oct. 15. Get your holiday shopping done without fighting crowds at the mall at our annual Holiday Boutique on Sunday, Nov. 19. If you are into cruising, join us March 22-26 for a Sisterhood cruise. Sisterhood has three interest groups this year. In addition to our Rosh Chodesh and fourth-Wednesday mahjongg groups, we have a new group, called Chai Mitzvah. Together with MoTAS, we also have a campership program, and we provide gifts for Bar and Bat Mitzvah kids, confirmation kids and the graduation class.

We also have programs that support the temple. One

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of our more important ones is our program to provide staff to set up and clean up for 52+ onegs a year, with our delicious ice cream punch – yum! Another is our program to provide staff to keep our Judaica shop open so that everyone has easy access to Judaica.



The ECEC camp has only one week left, and both children and teachers are sad to see this end. Our days have been filled with water play, baby ducks, martial arts, yoga, art and cooking, to name but a few of our activities.

The 2017/2018 school year begins on Aug. 28. Our teachers will spend the week prior to

school opening preparing for the year. We will be having our Annual ECEC Open House and Shabbat on Friday, Aug. 25 at 5 p.m. This will be followed by a pasta dinner. Even if you do not have a child in our preschool, please stop by and see how great the school is looking. Thank you so much to Barry Krowne and Debby Lieber for subsidizing the painting of our school offices. Thank you, too, to our energetic Sisterhood ladies who have re-sorted our library and have now offered to come in regularly to the school to read to the children.

Rosh Hashanah begins soon after our first day back at school. It can be difficult for our very young children, who have just settled in to the routine of coming to school, to start having days when there is no school. They will adjust back quite quickly. This is to be expected and is not cause for concern.

We will start working on apples and honey. We will

measure children to see how many apple heights they are. We will cook and bake with honey and with different kinds and colors of apples, and we always do a graph to see which type of apple is best liked by our children.

Yom Kippur is a holiday that is sometimes complex for children. At this age, empathy is just developing and children are extremely self-centered. Many children say "sorry" because a grownup is standing over them demanding that they say the word. We could be asking them to say any word they could think of and they will say it just to stop the adult insisting they apologize. We want children to grow up saying sorry from within, because they are truly apologetic about what has happened, not because they are being forced to say something.

This takes time, and the best way to teach children this lifelong understanding and skill is to model it at correct times. Apologize to your children in a heartfelt tone when you have done or said something that requires you to do so. Let them see you saying sorry to your spouse after shouting at each other. Let them see you saying sorry to the stranger who you accidentally bump into. I believe that setting examples is the best way to teach sorry, please and thank you to your children.


