A BUSY AND ACTIVE AUTUMN AHEAD FOR TAS TOTS

We have had a busy few months in the ECEC and ITC. We have learned about Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. We are now hoping to be exploring Fall, although, as I write this newsletter, it is still extremely hot and unfall-like. Singing about the leaves that are falling and turning red and orange seems out of place.

Our children are all settled in their routines and happy to come to school. We have now included a Science and Environmental Curriculum for our 3-year-old and 4-year-old classes. Jill Cullen, who is a TAS member, very kindly offered to share her knowledge in these fields with us and will now come once a month to teach the children about topics ranging from water conservation and trees to electricity. She began this month by talking to our children about recycling, the benefits and the importance of recycling, and helping children make correct decisions about what should go in the recycling bin or in the trash bin. Thank you so much, Jill.

We also have Temple member Becky Breuer visit a couple of times a month. She reads to our children, and they love having her visit. We would like to start an intergenerational program with more of our members,

whereby they visit once a month on Friday at 9 a.m. for about an hour. They could help us make challah and share their Shabbat stories with the children. If anyone is available to do something along these lines, please contact me at the school office. The children and teachers would love the interaction.

We have started having monthly Dine Out events. We have gone for frozen yogurt and to Pizza Rev, and these have been well attended by our ECEC families. Our last Dine Out was at Presto Pasta on November 14. Thank you to all who joined us and helped support the school.

At the beginning of November, we had the first of our monthly Friday morning Shabbat services. Parents joined us to welcome Shabbat at 9:15 a.m., instead of our usual time of 11 a.m. This was a way to not only show families how easy it is to do Shabbat, but to include our parents in more community activities.

We hosted a school Thanksgiving feast for all our families. We had 150 in attendance and it was a wonderful event! For Hanukkah, the children lit candles together every morning at school. We also had a Hanukkah Bim Bam Bimah with a candle lighting and sing-along on Friday, December 15.

Although it has passed, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you a Happy Hanukkah, and now a Happy New Year, all in the same sentence! May this year be filled with peace and prosperity for us all.

JEWS WITH BASEBALLS: A LOVE STORY

The love affair between Jews and Baseball goes back to the early part of the 20th century. It is beautifully chronicled in such movies as “Jews and Baseball: An American Love Story” and “The Life and Times of Hank Greenberg.” In the early 1900s, Jewish immigrants used baseball as a way to assimilate into American culture and since that time have adopted baseball as “their/our game.” While his love affair with baseball only started in 1974, congregant Gregg Garfinkel has recently found a unique way of combining his passion for baseball with his Jewish heritage. Specifically, Gregg has discovered his creative side and has artfully crafted a beautiful Hanukkah from gently used, professional baseballs.

Gregg indicates that this whole endeavor started on a dare. “I started this project last October when my son Benjamin was selling pine tree wreaths as a fundraiser for his baseball team. Someone suggested that we sell ‘real baseball’ wreaths, so I looked into the possibility of doing so. Since I have so much free time, I thought it would be a great diversion from everyday life.” Well, a new crafter was born. Gregg immediately took to researching such sites as Pinterest and Etsy to see if creating a baseball wreath was possible. “Once I confirmed that a baseball wreath was possible, I then turned my attention to creating something which reflected my upbringing, which has been centered around baseball and Judaism. That’s when I created the Baseball Hanukkah concept.” The response to Gregg’s handmade items has been overwhelming. He is selling out of them at boutiques and at local Judaica shops. He is humbled by the reception that his creations have garnered. “To see the items that I create being used in my friends, family, and client’s Hanukkah celebrations truly moves me.”

The baseball Hanukkah was so well received, that Gregg ventured into making them out of hockey pucks. “I didn’t realize that there were so many hockey fans in our congregation.” The clients that we spoke with

all appreciate the fact that Gregg can customize a Hanukkah for any team that has a logo. However, that customization comes with a price. “There is a dramatic surcharge for those who want a Giants or Ducks Hanukkah,” Gregg said jokingly.

A seasoned attorney with a vibrant law practice, Gregg finds this craft as a welcome escape from his “real job” as an attorney. “I didn’t think that I would ever be on a first name basis with the good folks at Joann Fabrics or Michaels, or complain to my son about burns from my hot glue gun. Nonetheless, it is such a great feeling to create something that brings friends and family joy, versus what I do on a daily basis at work.” Gregg’s efforts have also expanded to a much larger level of recognition, one of his handmade baseball Hanukkyot was recently accepted into the Jewish Baseball Hall of Fame!

TAS CONFIRMATION CLASS GETS TWO NEW TEACHERS

Rabbi Dalia Samansky was born in Philadelphia, however, she is fourth-generation raised in Los Angeles. Although she began Hebrew school here at TAS, she became a bat mitzvah at Temple Aliyah in Woodland Hills, went to college at Brandeis University and was ordained at Hebrew Union College. Rabbi Samansky is married to Jason, and they have two daughters -- Naomi, 9 (who went to preschool at TAS), and Tova, 6.

What influenced Rabbi Samansky to become a teacher of Judaism was the desire to share her passion for Judaism. She wanted to turn her “passion into a profession, and do what I love and call it work.” She feels it makes her a better person and enables her to share. For Rabbi Samansky, the most enjoyable thing about teaching is all the ideas the students bring to class, and the joy of having new students each year, over and over again. What she likes best is helping people find connection and relevance to Judaism in their life.

This February, she is looking forward to taking the Confirmation class to Washington, D.C., for the L'Taken Social Justice Seminar. Sponsored by the Religious Action Center, the advocacy arm of the reform movement, this trip will enable the students to bond together in friendship and to learn that “democracy is not a spectator sport.” They will learn to stand up for their Jewish values, learn to lobby for their causes, and will be given a chance to meet with a senator or representative on a topic the students will choose from a prepared list. The D.C. trip will be the highlight of the year for her Confirmation students, who will celebrate the culmination of their studies at the Confirmation service in May 2018.

Arnon Arad, TAS' other new Confirmation teacher, was born in Zambia, where his father worked for the Israeli government in agriculture. Subsequent to that, Arnon lived in Israel till he was 12, then moved to Puerto Rico, where he became a bar mitzvah. This “wandering Jew” also has lived in Florida, Las Vegas and on the Upper West Side of New York. Arnon moved to the Valley four years ago, as his ex-wife moved to San Jose with their two youngest children (Orli, 17; and Jaden, 14). His eldest daughter Shoshana, 20, lives here in L.A.

Arnon was educated at Nova Southeastern University and Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (Jerusalem) and graduated from the University of South Florida. He majored in religious studies and Judaic studies.

He loves sharing his life experiences and relating them to the Torah and Jewish values, which is the aspect of Judaism that he most enjoys imparting to his students. He loves to “find a connection with all of my students and know what they love and enjoy.” His mother is the reason Arnon became an educator. She trusted his ability, at age 16, to have him teach a class in religious school. His mother taught him that “every aspect of me can be brought into the classroom.” In addition, “My love for music, sports and Judaism made me into a well-rounded teacher.” Arnon looks forward to taking the Confirmation class to Washington, D.C., in February for the L'Taken Social Justice Seminar. He wants his students to be “emotionally connected to what they bring to D.C., and not just go through the motions.”

TAS RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

Hanukkah is one of my favorite Jewish holidays, so beautiful and family oriented. The days before Hanukkah, we decorate the house with Jewish stars and hanukkiyot. My boys rediscover their dreidel collection, and they fight over it and compete with each other. Hanukkah is the time when we invite family and friends to share the calories of the latkes and sufganiyot and the warmth from the light of the candles. My favorite day of Hanukkah is the last one when everybody brings their own hanukkiah and the lights all shine so brightly.

Growing up in Israel was a different experience. In the United States, Hanukkah is the holiday of jelly doughnuts, dreidels and hanukiyot that children enjoy, but in Israel, it does not have the same effect as it does here in the United States. What is it that makes it such a unique experience and an important holiday for the American Jewish people? Many believe that living in the diaspora forced the Jewish people to transform Hanukkah so it would be attractive for our children who see their non-Jewish friends decorating their Christmas trees and getting presents from Santa Claus.

No matter what brings us all together during Hanukkah, it is a great time to connect with the community. TAS Religious School focused on many different aspects for this Hanukkah. Our first through seventh grade students worked hard on creating the Hanukkah centerpieces for our community dinner. This was a lovely project making Hanukkah symbols and decorating silver sprayed branches that Irit Shemesh, our art teacher, collected. You can see the final result in the pictures below.

On Sunday, December 10, our Religious School students participated in a Hanukkah celebration. All students got the chance to go on stage and sing Hanukkah songs. Third through sixth grade students participated in Robbo's original play, "The Good, The Bad and The Maccabee". All students left the Temple with a bag of chocolate gelt and a new dreidel donated by Sisterhood. TAS high school students also got to celebrate Hanukkah and light the first candle together. Thanks to TASTY board members for assisting.

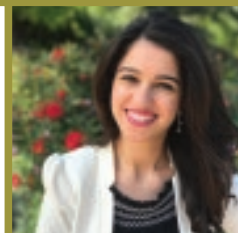

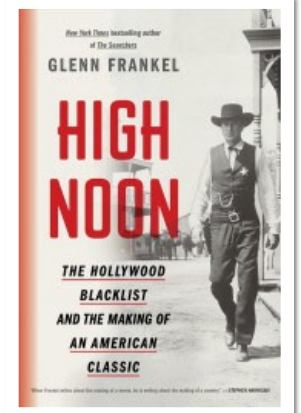

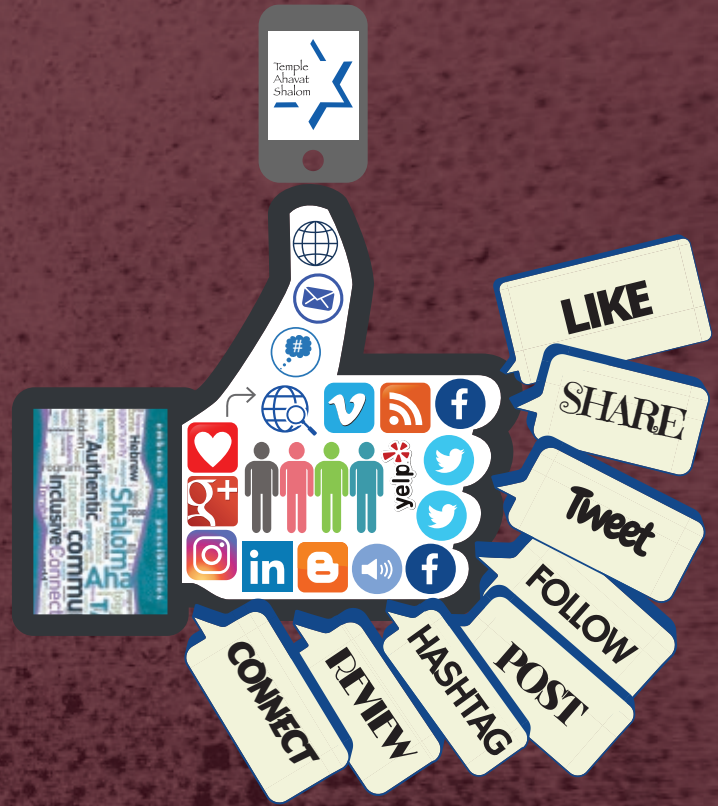
