OUR CAN-DO CANTOR



Cantor Kenneth Cohen – known to his TAS family as Cantor Ken – grew up in the suburbs of New York City, attending a mix of Jewish day and public schools. He graduated from the State University of New York at Binghamton, where he received

a bachelor's degree in History and a master's in Ethnomusicology. He studied Opera at the Rubin Academy of Music in Tel Aviv, and, in 1982, was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America as a cantor of the Jewish faith. At New York University, he pursued his doctoral studies in Ethnomusicology, studying the Sephardic Jewish communities of Brooklyn, N.Y.

Cantor Ken spent 20 years as cantor at Temple Shalom in Greenwich, Conn., where he cultivated many caring, long-lasting relationships. Cantor Ken also held the position of Founding Director of Cantorial Studies at the Academy for Jewish Religion in New York for nearly two decades. The Academy trains spiritual leaders to serve all the modern streams (denominations) of Judaism. In

LES AND TYREE WIEDER



This is a story about two people from vastly different backgrounds who created a wonderful life together. By embracing each other's cultures and history, focusing on family, marriage, careers and the wonders of parenthood, the

Wieders have enjoyed a rich and multi-faceted life.

Tyree is the former President of Los Angeles Valley College, where she served for an unprecedented 14 years, retiring in 2008. In 2009, she came out of retirement to serve as Interim Chancellor of the L.A. Community College District. Again in 2011, she left retirement to become the Interim President of East Los Angeles College. She was the first African-American female to serve as the head of these three institutions.

Among her distinguished awards are the Champion of Education Award from the Economic Alliance; the Harlan Ballin Community Service Award from the Valley Industry and Commerce Association (VICA); the Armand Arabian Award for Leaders in Public Service; the Woman of the Year for the 40th Assembly District;

his role as Cantorial Director, he developed a new vision of the cantorate, focusing on the cantor as educator and facilitator, as well as emphasizing the collaborative leadership roles of cantors and rabbis. He was awarded the Jewish Music Leadership Award by the Academy for his role in shaping dozens of cantorial and rabbinical professionals, helping inspire future generations of the Jewish people.

Moving to the West Coast, Cantor Ken served congregation Beth Shir Shalom in Santa Monica for four years. There, he built a career center for those seeking employment, created interfaith bridges with the Baptist and Muslim communities, directed a religious school, and composed and arranged original music for the synagogue's eight-piece musical ensemble.

Witnessing the contraction of the modern American synagogue, Cantor Ken began to explore what lies in the hearts and minds of Jews of all ages with the goal of reinvigorating U.S. synagogue life. Toward this purpose, he has interviewed some 350 Jewish notables throughout the U.S. – speaking with Jewish songwriters, artists, dancers, educators, cantors, rabbis, spiritual mentors and heads of Jewish organizations. Listening to their passion, perspectives and wisdom, his hope is to share these inspiring conversations in various formats to create a fresh current of ideas within Judaism.

In 2015, Cantor Ken spent four months in Australia, serving as the hazzan of Emanuel Synagogue in Sydney, a community of more than 1,600 families. There, he was able to bring his relational work into the synagogue, energizing the community to discover its own passionate, fearless voice.

Upon returning to the U.S., he launched the Ignite Project, working with Jewish communities to cultivate relationships and help synagogues reimagine themselves for the 21st century.

Most recently, Cantor Ken has been part of our TAS family, where, for the past two years, he has worked closely with us through challenging times, inspiring and engaging our members so as to build a robust spiritual community in Northridge for years to come.

and recognition by the San Fernando Valley Business Journal as one of the "Women Who Mean Business" and one of the Valley's 25 most influential business leaders.

An award-winning playwright for over 50 years, Les retired as head of the Performing Arts Department at Moorpark College, where he wrote, produced and directed theatrical productions. In addition to his theater work, he created and directed numerous TV commercials, documentaries and music videos. His play "Voices" received recognition for its creative production about the Slave Narrative tapes compiled in the 1930s. In 2005, he received the NAACP President's Award for his work in fostering diversity in the theater. He also won the NAACP Image Award for writing and directing "Sojourner: The Story of Sojourner Truth."

Prior to their marriage in 1981, Tyree converted to Judaism, and in 1986 they joined TAS, where their daughter Shavonne became a Bat Mitzvah in 1994 and a Confirmand in 1998. The Wieders have been an integral part of the TAS family ever since. Tyree is currently a Vice President on the Board of Trustees, having served as chair of the Personnel Committee where she professionalized our systems, updated reviews, improved record keeping and initiated contracts. Les has skillfully directed a number of highly successful annual Cantors Concerts. Tyree is a member of Sisterhood and together, they have attended every Gala and supported the Count Me In campaign each year.

In their retirement, they have enjoyed traveling the world, including Shavonne in many of their journeys. Les enjoys playing golf and continues his search for the perfect martini. Tyree spends a large chunk of her time working on Temple projects, the L.A. Valley College Presidents Circle and enjoying her large family.

Their most recent accomplishment has been publishing "Matzo Balls and Cornbread: A Love Story," which chronicles their lives, their 38-year marriage and the blending of their very diverse backgrounds.

When asked what was the best thing he ever did in his life, Les answered, "Marrying Tyree. She gave my life purpose."

UNIVERSAL MESSAGES OF PASSOVER

FROM THE DESK OF RABBILYF. SENIOR RABBI

JEWS AROUND THE WORLD HAVE BEEN AND ARE ATTENDING PASSOVER SEDERS. WHAT ARE SOME OF THE UNIVERSAL MESSAGES OF PASSOVER?

One of the more powerful messages of Passover is that our past, as a people and as individuals, does not have to define our future. Our ancestors were the lowest level of society, slaves deprived of human freedom and destined for a life of misery.

But with the grace of God we were rescued from slavery, and destined to be a free people, living for over 3,000 years under the guidance of our Torah. Who would have believed that the slaves of Egypt would become an enduring people that continue to leave a lasting imprint on almost every area of human existence?

Consider that of the nearly 900 Nobel Prize winners, over 200 (or over 20%) were Jewish. This compares with a Jewish population that is but a tiny fraction of 1% of the humans alive today. Passover clearly shows us that even a people or an individual that starts with nothing can still achieve great things in this world. The past does not determine the future.

Yet, freedom and achievements are not the only guideposts from our Passover ancestry; in *Shemot* 10:3 we learn: "Let my people go so they can worship me." What does it mean to serve God as a Jew? The way we treat other people must be the right Jewish way. We are obligated to treat others the way that we want to be treated, with respect (Kavod) and dignity.

The late psychiatrist and Holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl was the author of the deeply profound book about what he learned from the Holocaust, titled *Man's Search for Meaning*. Incredibly, Dr. Frankl observed that even under the most horrific circumstances of the Holocaust, some people were able to rise above the suffering to treat others with kindness.

Later in life, Frankl came to believe that the American Statue of Liberty was wonderful, but insufficient guidance for human existence. He believed that the Statue of Liberty on the East Coast should be supplemented by a Statue of Responsibility on the West Coast. Indeed, freedom and responsibility to repair the world (Tikkun Olam) go hand-in-hand with our Torah values.

May we continue celebrating this Passover with gratitude for our freedom, and rededicate ourselves to making our community and world a better and more compassionate place!










TAS BOOK GROUP SELECTIONS FOR APRIL, MAY AND JUNE




